"Communist propaganda here, the worry of the 'patriotic' societies, is non-existent as far as the Soviet Union is concerned, as the party there definitely decided to delay work towards converting the world to communism until the experiment had proven itself in Russia," Henson ointed out.

Finally, the speaker touched on the influence of the move on the foreign policy of the United States, pointing out that until after the World War, the matter of recognition was not judged upon approval of the de facto rule, but merely upon definite proof of its existence. On these standards, the Russian government has deserved recognition for fourteen years, he
