**Henson Speaks on Soviet Recognition**

be settled, and probably is, by now," the economist said.

"Communist propaganda here, the worry of the 'patriotic' societies, is non-existent as far as the Soviet Union is concerned, as the party there definitely decided to delay work towards converting the world to communism until the experiment had proven itself in Russia," Henson pointed out.

Finally, the speaker touched on the influence of the move on the foreign policy of the United States, pointing out that until after the World War, the matter of recognition was not judged upon approval of the *de facto* rule, but merely upon definite proof of its existence. On these standards, the Russian government has deserved recognition for fourteen years, he said.

Speaking of the problem of religious toleration for American citizens in Russia, which President Roosevelt is supposed to be considering, the speaker pointed out that such a matter was hardly within the powers of the government here to control, that it hasn't, and doesn't try to in countries such as Germany.
