Supplanting the usual International Debate, an Intercollegiate Forum will feature the first seasonal program under the supervision of the Forensic Council when two University of Pittsburgh speakers meet two members of the College debating team in Schwab auditorium at 7:30 o'clock Saturday night

The topic of the forum reads, "Should the essential features of the N. I. R. A. be adopted as the permanent policy of the United States?" As the forum plan has been modified to meet local conditions, each representative will speak for twelve minutes and then will be allowed a short period in which to restate his views or criticize other views expressed.


