CITIES SHOW INCREASES IN NIGHT SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

Four cities this year have shown outstanding increases in night school enrollment for engineering extension courses as compared with last year, according to Prof. J. Orvis Keller, of the engineering extension department. Clairton's and Scranton's enrollments increased ninety-three per cent. Altoona's was eighty-two per cent greater, and Allentown's stepped up forty-four per cent.

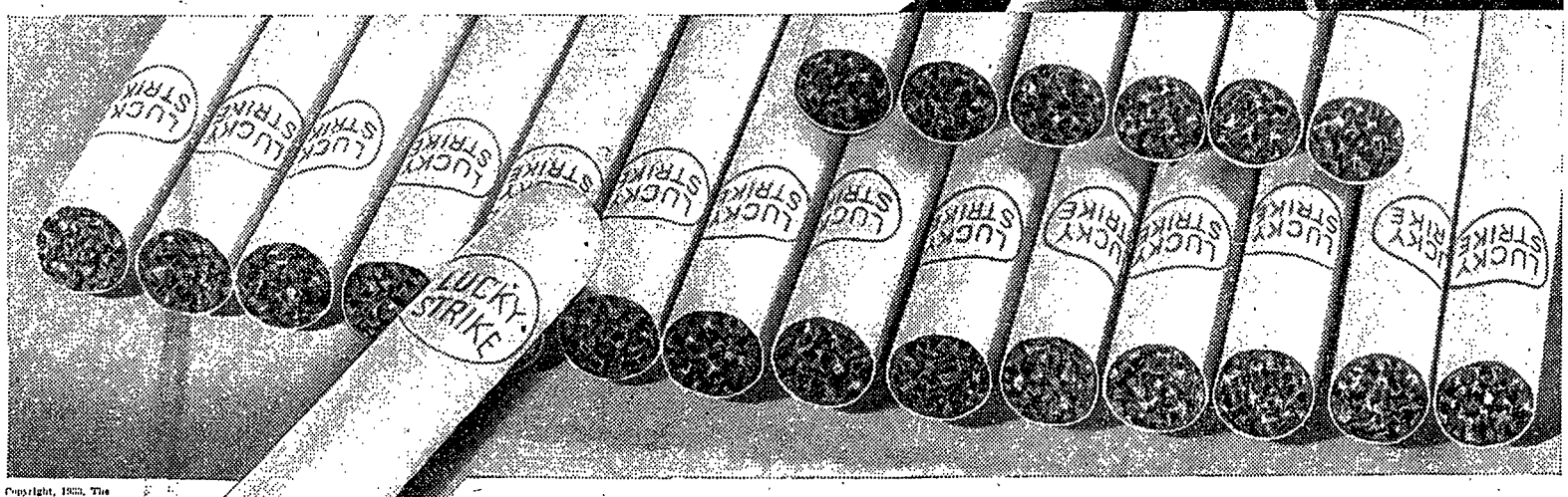
