**WALLER TO GUIDE FRESHMAN DIVISION**

Section for L. A. Freshmen With Low Grades Will Continue For Rest of Year

The policy of placing freshmen Liberal Artists who flunk fifty per cent of more of their credits in a special section will be continued this year, declared Dean Charles W. Stoddart in an interview today. The section will be in charge of Dr. Willard Waller, of the department of economics and sociology.

At the end of the first semester of the school year 1931-1932, twelve men were placed in this probation section. Of this number there were only three that were later dropped by the College. Four are still in college and the other five dropped out of their own accord.

Reasons for Failure Given  
 In the school year 1932-1933, fourteen men were placed on the probation list. At the end of the year four of these men were dropped by the College. One other failed to return to school.

"Failure to become adjusted to college life, extra curricular activities, home influence and persuasion as to what course shall be taken, and so forth could contribute to reasons for students flunking so many credits," Dean Stoddart explained. "While twenty percent of the probation section is all that has been kept in college, this is sufficient to make the plan worthwhile."

Thirty-three percent of the Liberal Artists in college had below grades turned in at the end of the eight weeks this semester Dean Stoddart revealed. Thirty-seven percent of the freshman class in this school had below grades. These percentages are the same as those of last year.

**"Sex Control Necessary... Through Fear, Unwholesome"--- Bernreuter**

"Sex is as wholesome as anything, but if the desire is expressed at the wrong times, it is improper and harmful," Dr. Robert G. Bernreuter, professor of education and psychology, declared in concluding his lecture on "Sex, and the Social Life," which he gave before the members of the Social Problems club last night.

People should not fear sexual expression, Dr. Bernreuter asserted, but it should be adequately controlled. He said, however, that this drive should not be controlled by fear, as is too often the case, but rather by a rational and intellectual attitude.

"The principal factor causing unhappiness in married men and women is that they were rebuffed when they tried to learn about sex in their childhood," he said. He continued by saying "Children should have their questions on this matter answered honestly, accurately, and at an early age."

People can enter into marriage relations successfully, even if they have had no previous sex expression, providing that they have an understanding of its true significance, Dr. Bernreuter stated.

He said that individuals who go into marriage with a dread of sexual relations are not going to be changed by the mere ritual of marriage.

"All truly great countries have curbed sex drives with taboos. When these taboos are cast aside is the early sign of a decay in that civilization." "The field of psychology owes Freud a debt for his making sex a matter for rational discussion," he said.

**WATTS ADDRESSES ANNUAL INSTITUTIONAL CONFERENCE**

**FACULTY PETITION FOR TUGWELL BILL**

One hundred ninety-nine members of the College faculty have signed a petition urging Congressman J. Banks Kurtz, of the twenty-first district, to support the Tugwell bill, which has been introduced in the Senate.

At the same time, copies of the petition were sent to all other Senators and Representatives of the Commonwealth. The signers of the petition are from the administrative, teaching, and research staffs of the College.

The letter, which accompanies the petition, points out that the petitioners, because of their connection in "many different fields of professional interest and scientific research," desire the passage of the bill as a "vital necessity for the protection of the health and welfare of the consuming public of America."

Commonly known as the Federal Foods and Drugs Act, the Tugwell bill would make illegal publication of any advertisement of products which have not been approved as beneficial by Federal inspectors.
