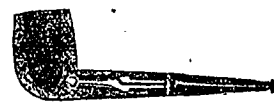
under the direction of Miss Amy M. Fischer, of the School of Physical Education and Athletics. No fee will be charged for the course, which will continue for eight weeks.

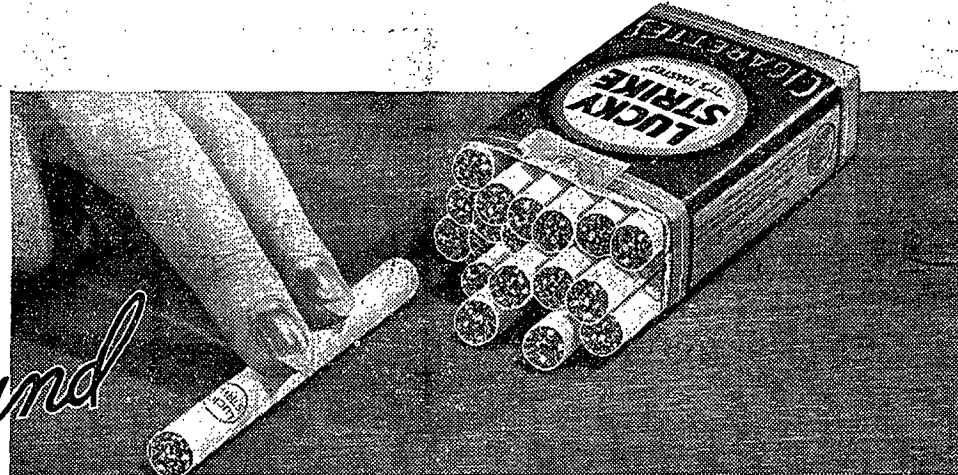

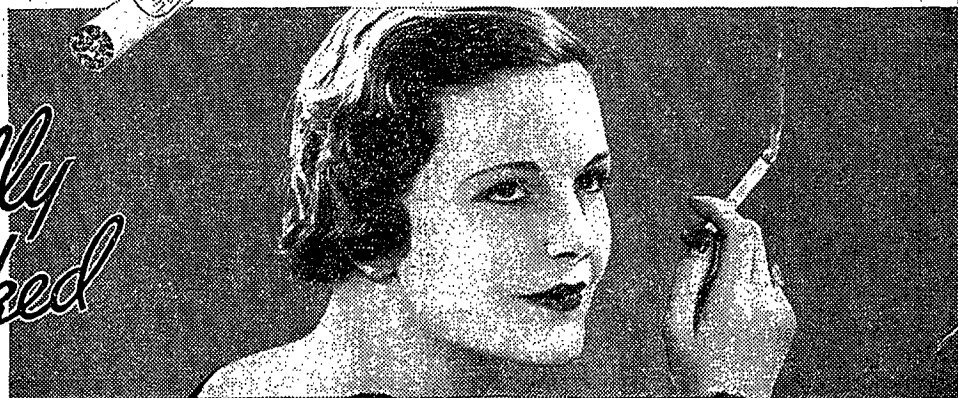
