

## Frear Hall Courtmen Take I. M. Tourney in Close Tilt

### Sigma Phi Epsilon Loses to Men's Dormitory, 22-21, in Championship Contest

Frear hall courtmen sprang a surprise Saturday afternoon by defeating Sigma Alpha Epsilon in a hotly-contested game, 22-to-21. The game was nip and tuck throughout the entire contest, first the hall boys leaping into the lead, and then their opponents.

Len Cimbal and Tom Evans ran up most of the Frear hall tallies, the former scoring ten points, all field goals, while the other made four fouls and a field goal. A foul and field goal in the last minute of play by this pair decided the battle when Frear was trailing by two points.

Diek Horsfall at center and Frank O'Hora at forward were outstanding players on the Sigma Alpha Epsilon quintet. O'Hora called seven points, three fouls and a basket, and Horsfall dropped in a foul and a basket.

Trailing 10-to-4 at the end of the first quarter, the fraternity men staged a come-back to lead 12-to-10 at the half. In the third period Frear hall scored eight points to their opponents' four, while in the final quarter the latter led in the scoring by one point, five-to-four.

Strandine, who was one of the referees in the final game, expects to take a central board examination in the near future to qualify himself for officiating in collegiate games next year. He has had several years' experience refereeing professional contests in Chicago.

Frear hall reached the finals by winning over Sigma Nu Thursday night, 18-to-17, while Sigma Alpha Epsilon trounced Theta Kappa Phi, 30-to-16. Instead of the championship cup going to the Frear hall team, Sigma Alpha Epsilon plans to present them with medals and have the cup engraved "runner-up" for themselves.

## SPRING FOOTBALL PRACTICE STARTS

Over 50 Men Report to Coach 'Bob' Higgins; Others Expected After Vacation

Over fifty men reported for spring football Wednesday, while other candidates are expected immediately after Easter vacation. The men are meeting at Recreation hall daily at 4 o'clock.

Coach Earl Leslie and Coach Nelson Walke will aid in coaching the men while ex-Captain Tommy Slusser, "King" Cole, "Rosy" Rosenberg, and Parker Berry will act as the student proctors.

## LIONS WILL MEET PANTHERS IN 1935

### To Resume Encounters at Pitt Stadium After 2-Season Lapse in Relations

After a two-season lapse in athletic relations, the Nittany Lion grid team will meet the University of Pittsburgh in the Pitt Stadium October 26, 1935, Neil M. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics, announced this morning.

Pittsburgh will return to the Lion schedule in 1936 and 1937, as well as in 1938, a three-year agreement having been signed. Penn State has the option of having one of the last two games played on New Beaver field, but as yet College athletic authorities have not worked out definite arrangements for either of the last two games in the series.

## Pitt Adopts Non-subsidization

Efforts are being made to arrange the 1936 game for the season's finale on both the Panther and Nittany Lion schedule. Since the College has adopted a policy against Thanksgiving Day games away from State College because of the one-day vacation period here, the contest will probably be scheduled for the Saturday before Thanksgiving Day, it was learned.

The meeting between Pitt and Penn State will be the first since 1931, when the Lions were defeated by a 41-to-6 score on New Beaver field. Since that time the Panthers have adopted a policy of non-subsidization for athletes, which became effective last year.

Included in the Pittsburgh series is the third game that has been definitely arranged on the Lion's gridmen's 1935 schedule. A home-and-home series with Lehigh for 1935 and 1936, and a one-game contract with Lebanon Valley for 1935 were announced last week.

### Sigma Alpha Epsilon Places 2 Men; 3 Other Teams Win 1 Post Each in Selection

Sigma Alpha Epsilon, runner-up in this year's intramural basketball tournament, placed two men on the all-intramural court team selected by officials of the tournament Saturday, while Frear hall, winners of the competition, Phi Kappa Sigma, and Theta Kappa Phi each had one of their players mentioned.

Five teams were represented in the second team selections. They were Lambda Chi Alpha, Beta Theta Pi, Phi Kappa Sigma, Sigma Nu, and Unit 3. In making the selections, the officials judged the men on continued outstanding playing throughout several games, instead of on merely one night's performance.

Cimbal Selected Star Guard Believed to be one of the best centers ever to appear in intramural cage competition, Diek Horsfall, of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, was the judges' selection for that post. Oscar Felker, of Phi Kappa Sigma, was the second

string pick for the tap-off position. A consistently heavy scorer, Len Cimbal, of Frear hall, was first choice for guard, while John Conley, Theta Kappa Phi satellite, was named to the other guard post. Joe Rambo, of Sigma Nu, and Lee Strasser, of Unit 3, were picked for the second team guard positions. Bud Harper, of Phi Kappa Sigma, and Frank O'Hora, of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, dependable, steady players, with good eyes for the basket, were named as the two first string forwards. On the second team, Bob Wilkinson, of Lambda Chi Alpha, and Ed Caughy, of Beta Theta Pi, were named to these posts. Bob Peaslee, intramural basketball manager, Rubo Strandine, Joe Bielicki, Joe Buczkowski, Jim Reed, and Bill Sullitt, all referees in the tournament, made the selections for the all-intramural teams.
