

BEDEK SURE OF ONLY 2 POSITIONS

Baseball Mentor To Build Nine Around 3 Veterans; Parks, Lutzer, Kasczak

It's a far cry from the bridge table to the diamond, but Joe Bedek, Lion baseball coach, is socializing in a big way. Object: To learn how to shuffle and pick out high cards as a background for selecting the 1934 Nittany nine which will open the season here against Susquehanna April 21.

The chief reason is that only left field and the pitching department are definitely supplied with veteran material. Although three other lettermen will be available for other positions, all three will be in entirely new positions from those that they occupied last year.

Captain Bill Kasczak in the sun field and Keith Parks and Jack Lutzer, righthanded veterans from last season, seem to be the solutions to those two problems. Johnny Stocker, an outfielder last year, will be switched to third base, his normal position, and "Zev" Zawacki, a first baseman for the last two seasons, will be a receiver. "Shorty" Edwards, who broke into a few games as an outfield reserve in 1933, may or may not be one of Captain Kasczak's mates.

The problem, then, is to find two new infielders and two new outfielders who can deliver in regular positions, and a few reserves in all departments. Coach Bedek is hoping that the deck used in his shuffling activities turns out to be of the pin-ocle variety—then there will be eight aces.

Either Joe Bielicki or Al Mikolonis seems to have the second base job nailed down. Just at present it looks like the former will get the call, but neither has tasted varsity competition before. Frank "Red" O'Hara, captain of the freshman nine last year, seems slated for the shortstop position, while Bill McKechnie will get Bedek's nod at first base at the start.

The answer to Coach Bedek's problem of two more outfielders to pair up with Captain Kasczak seems to lie with Miller and Larson, up from the yearling team last year.

Nearly 3,000 Mat Fans See Intercollegiate

Werner Issues Call for Other Candidates; Final Period Of Training Starts

Nearly 3,000 people paid admissions to witness the wrestling intercollegiate here March 16 and 17, according to C. Thompson Stott '34, manager of the tourney. Three hundred seventy-nine attended the preliminaries, while 1,045 witnessed the semi-final bouts. Fifteen hundred and fifty-one paid admissions were recorded at the finals.

About thirty-five per cent of the visiting teams' expenses were paid after the costs of running the tourney were taken care of, according to Stott. This compares favorably with last year's meet, Stott pointed out, when Columbia, the tourney host, paid off at the rate of thirty-nine per cent. However, Columbia charged two dollars for the finals, offsetting a lowered attendance.

2 MEETS ARRANGED FOR '37 TRACKMEN

Werner Issues Call for Other Candidates; Final Period Of Training Starts

With the start of the final training period before the opening of the season, Track Coach "Chick" Werner has issued a call for all freshmen track candidates. Two meets have been arranged for freshman competition and a relay team will be taken to the Penn Relays.

The Pitt freshmen will accompany the Panther varsity here on May 5, while the Lion plebes will also meet the Syracuse first-year men here on May 19, the week-end of the annual Penn State Interscholastics. The Penn Relays will be held on the 27 and 28 of this month.

"There seems to be a false impression that there are no meets for the

freshmen this spring and many eligible men have not yet reported," Werner said. "I would like to urge every man to come out within the next week. Fraternities and athletic units should take the initiative in having candidates turn out."

All events in the track and field will be placed on the freshman training schedule. Many candidates have been given equipment, but Coach Werner feels that many former high school athletes have not been seen. Only one meet was held for the

freshman team last year, the Lion plebes by a 7-1 1/3-16-64 2-3 score.


