Work on the 1935 "La Vie" will get underway at 7:30 o'clock tonight, when all candidates for the editorial, art, and business staffs will meet in the publication office, Room 315, Old Main. William Y. E. Rambo '35, editor-in-chief, will address the meeting which will precede assigning of work for the year.

Although the actual designs for the book have not been completed, work has gone forward since candidates

were first called last spring, Rambo said. Additional candidates, who have not yet worked on the book, will be eligible for competition for positions on this year's junior board if they attend tonight's meeting, he said. All candidates, however, must be juniors.

Although the engraving and printing contract has been awarded, selection of a suitable cover for this year has not been completed, accord-

ing to Carl R. Conrad '35, art editor. Bids will be received within the next few weeks. Members of the College fine arts department and the "La Vie" staff cooperate in choosing a dominant design for the book.

With the meeting tonight, staffs will be split into their respective divisions: Business, women's editorial, editorial, and art, and will work separately in the future.
