Booters Will Open Season Against Gettysburg Here Tomorrow

2 SOPHOMORES BID FOR POSITIONS ON STARTING LINE-UP

Center Forward, Inside Right Stations Go To New Men

With high—and justified—hopes for a successful season, an almost entirely veteran soccer team will open their season on New Beaver field Saturday at 12:30 o'clock against the usually powerful Gettysburg squad, also opening their season.

Only two sophomores have received bids to the starting line-up. Bill McEwan, sensation of last year's cub team, has cinched the center forward berth, and Frank Osterlund is Coach Bill Jeffrey's choice for inside right. Ray Bell, who permits the opposition to score only in leap years, will defend the local uprights.

Jack Binns and Bob Sigel are struggling for the right fullback post, while Bob Graham is the left fullback starter. Captain Jack Fletcher will hold down the center halfback position, with Bill Suttiff and Ed Long flanking him at the other halfback jobs.

Marple Ambler at outside right and Joe Bielicki at inside left are other certainties for the encounter with the Bullets. Hermon Casterline and George Corbett are candidates for the remaining berth of outside left, with experience in favor of the latter.

Showing plenty of drive, the boys are making their practices torrid sessions of heads-up soccer. Many are making strong bids for starting places in spite of the almost invincible permanency of the regular line-up. Substitutes will be few, according to the mentor, and used only if absolutely necessary. An "iron man" squad is not beyond possibility, at that.

The freshman booters, in the meanwhile, are letting no grass grow under their cleats, having played two games with the local high school so far. Wednesday night the pebes had a satisfying revenge, defeating the Maroon and White easily, 4-to-1. Better teamwork, the natural result of additional practice, and the ability to pick up many tips from observation of the varsity, plus the expert criticisms of Coach Jeffrey, have caused a marked improvement in the play of the first-year men.

Wacker, at inside right, was the big gun in the Nittany offense, scoring two of his team's goals, while Parsons tallied another. The high school's goal came on a penalty kick. Among others who are delivering the goods are Dye, named temporary captain for Wednesday's tilt, Mandell, Myhoff, Noll, and Hosterman.
