Boerlin Tells of Gains In Extension Students

More men employed in the industries of Pennsylvania are taking systematized courses of study here this year than for the last few years, according to Irvin C. Boerlin, instructor in engineering extension.

"The enrollment of 456 students is not only better than before," Boerlin said, "but is composed of students who are seriously interested in gaining a better proficiency in the industry in which they are engaged." Although compilation of other industrial extension work of the college is not complete, Boerlin reported that the engineering branch schools have shown an increase in students.
