

5 Athletic Teams Will See Action Tomorrow; Matmen Will Feature on Schedule

Columbia Wrestlers, Army Courtmen To Meet Nittany Varsity Teams; Freshmen To Clash With Brown Five.

With the Columbia wrestling matches as a highlight, five Penn State athletic teams will see action in dual competition tomorrow. Varsity wrestling and both varsity and freshman basketball have been scheduled for local consumption, while the boxing and track teams will be in action on foreign fields.

Columbia, whipped by the Lions 15-13 in New York City last winter, will have a return engagement with

Penn State in Recreation hall at 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Columbia is reported to have a stronger team than last year, with most of their strength in the three lightest weights and the heavyweight class.

Lou Kreizman definitely gave assurance that he will wrestle, but it is doubtful whether Coach Charlie Spedel will enter him as a Penn State pachyderm in this meet, since he has

had too little time to get into top condition.

At 7:30 o'clock Army's quintet which has been rolling up a wide swath of victories so far this year will meet Penn State's basketball team in Recreation hall, scene of Bucknell's demise by a 41-32 score Wednesday night. Army was Duquesne's twenty-third victim last Saturday night, but the Dukes went the limit to win 26-23. Coach 'Spike' Leslie will probably start the same line-up which began in the Bucknell game: Stocker and Riley, forwards; Hunter, center; Kornick and Frank Smith, guards.

The Penn State freshman team, under Coach Herman Everhardus for the first time, will meet Brown Prep in Recreation hall at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Brown has won fourteen straight games. The untried Lion Cubs will line up with Katz and Meihoff, forwards; Reichenbach, center; Wear and Proksa, guards.

On foreign fields, the boxing team will be looking for their third victory of the infant season at College Park, Md., against the University of Maryland, while the track team will enter the West Virginia invitation meet. The boxing is scheduled for tomorrow night; the meet tomorrow afternoon. Coach 'Chick' Werner will enter twenty-two Penn State runners in the meet, which will draw the cream of Eastern college runners. The Lions are reported to have their best chance of capturing a title in the varsity relays, but they will be hampered by the weather making impossible the using of the board track outdoors.

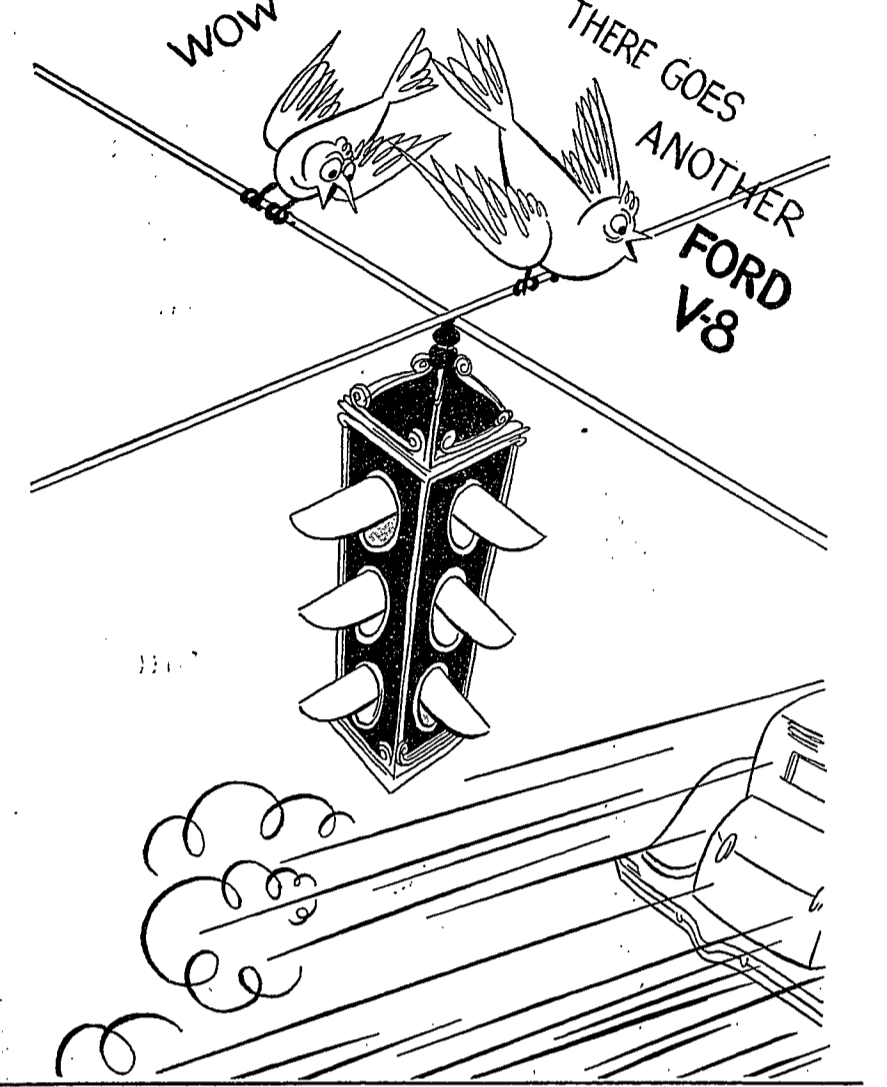
