

Sex Problems Most Popular of Fireside Topics, Data Show

Intelligent information and discussion of sex problems seem to fill a definite need in the life of the students on this campus, since three of the five most popular topics on the Fireside Readings series are on the sex question, according to a recent compilation of data by the P.S.C.A., sponsors of the series.

The five most popular topics and their leaders are "The New Deal," Prof. Sheldon C. Tanner, of the department of economics and sociology; "The Art of Reading," Robert E. Galbraith, of the department of English composition; "Solving Our Own Sex Problems," Dr. Elwood C. Davis, of the School of Physical Education and Athletics; and "What Should a College Student Know About Sex?" by Dr. Joseph P. Ritenour, College physician, and Dr. Bruce V. Moore, head of the department of education and psychology.

150 Meetings Scheduled

Speakers who have been requested by ten or more groups include: Dr. Davis; Herman Everhardus, of the department of physical education and athletics; John M. H. Ferguson, of the department of history and political science; Professor Galbraith; Dr. George W. Hartmann, of the department of education and psychology; and William Jeffrey, of the department of physical education and athletics.

Others included in this list are: Prof. Julius E. Kalfuss, of the department of civil engineering; Dr. Franklin B. Krauss, of the department of classical language; Prof. Mason Long, of the department of English literature; Dr. Moore; Dean of Women Charlotte E. Ray; Dr. Ritenour; Prof. S. K. Stevens, of the department of history and political science; and Professor Tanner.

Forty-eight groups, the largest in the history of the series have requested speakers, and 150 meetings have been scheduled thus far. This is the first year that the sessions have been offered to non-fraternity living and boarding groups. It is planned to hold meetings for non-fraternity groups in one of the Old Main lounges, if application is made by groups of eight or more students.

Everhardus To Speak Before Alumni Dinner

Herman Everhardus, assistant football coach, will be the principal speaker at a banquet to be held by the Penn State Alumni association of Cambria and Somerset counties, in Johnstown on Thursday.
