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### Poster Contest For Prom Opens

Winner of Competition To Get Complimentary Ticket To Junior Dance.

One complimentary ticket, worth \$4.00 will be awarded to the winner of this year's Junior Prom poster contest which opens today, Charles E. Annett '36, contest chairman, has announced. The Prom is to be held on May 3 with music by Glen Gray and his Casa Loma Orchestra.

In order to keep politics out of the choice of the contest winner, the Prom committee will not see any of the posters until after they have been judged. Posters should be left at the office of Prof. Andrew W. Case, of the department of architecture, in Room 225, Engineering "F" before Friday noon, April 26.

**Judges Announced**  
In addition to Professor Case, judges will be Miss Helen M. Savard and Prof. Harold E. Dickson, both of the department of architecture. All posters must be twenty-two inches wide by twenty-eight inches high and only regulation sizes will be judged. No portrait of the band leader or the band may appear on the posters.

"Advertising value, originality, composition, and neatness will be the main considerations upon which the posters will be judged," Annett explained. "The medium to be used is limited to showcard colors and temper colors in order to assure sharpness and visibility. No more than four colors may be used, but no restrictions are placed on kind of paper except that it should be stiff enough to stand up alone."

The wording is to be as brief as possible but must contain the title of the dance, name of the band, and admission price. One person may submit as many posters as he wishes and the name of the artist must be temporarily covered when the poster is handed in, Annett said.

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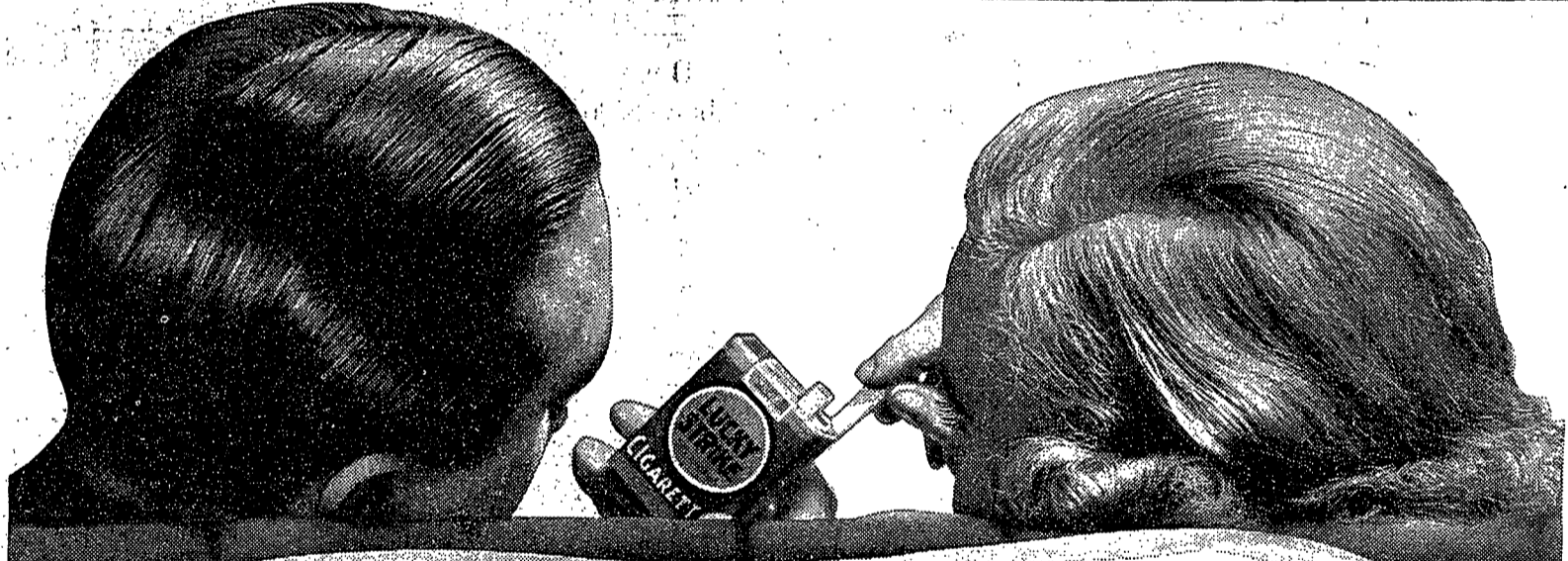
