When I came to the College in 1902 there was an organization of student who, for a number of years, had given an annual minstrel show, and who for some years thereafter, continue to do so. That organization was known as the Pharsonians, and numbered emerge its manhours numbers. bered among its members, numerou distinguished alumni of the classe preceding 1906 or 1907, when, if my ecollection is not too far at fault. recollection is not too far at fault, it disbanded. About that time, 1907-8, to be exact, the Thespians began the production of musical comedies, and the Pharsonians lapsed into innocuous desuctude. Some of the older alumni, who might rend the article from which I quote, could, with reasonableness inquire, "How come?";


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
