Freshman Defeats Albere, 1 up, On 20th Hole in Match Of Semi-Finals.

Freddy Machmer '39 and John Coletti '36 will vie for the all-College golf championship in a 36-hole match play round tomorrow afternoon.

Machmer fought his way to the final round after a spectacular triumph over Jay Albere last week, winning 1 up, on the twentieth hole. Albere was three down on the eighth and then recovered to take the ninth and tenth holes.

Albere lost the eleventh hole by default when he struck sand on the backswing in endeavoring to get out of a trap. All even on the eighteenth, the pair was forced to play the two extra holes to decide the match.

Ed Caughey staged an upset to defeat Bill Gross, 2 and 1, in the semi-finals of the second sixteen. Gross placed third in the finals of the P. I. A. A. golf tournament held here last spring.

Caughey has still to meet Klingensmith, the winner of this match to meet Burkett. Burkett defeated Powell, 3 and 1, in their match last week.

A silver loving cup will be awarded to the winner of the tournament, while the runner-up and the winner of the second flight and runner-up in that flight will receive medals.

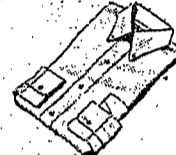
Gamma Phi Beta sorority is entertaining transfers at a tea in the S suite on Friday afternoon.
