Of \$300 To Landsberg Academy Makes Grant

The American Academy of Arts and Sciences has granted Dr. Helmut Landsberg, meteorologist of the College, \$300 to investigate suspensions in the air, particularly the larger size dust particles, Dean Edward Steidle of the School of Mineral Industries announced recently.

The grant will permit Dr. Landsberg to obtain assistance in classifying and cataloging the data obtained in 600 to 700 recordings taken during the past year. The immediate investigation is to determine the number of particles in the air in relation to visibility and the type of material which forms the dust.

In assisting to establish the dust observation station at Penn State, the Academy is helping to found another station for large-scale observations of this type. There are only four others in the world. The other stations are affiliated with the Carnegie Institution at Washington, D. C.; the Mellon Institute at Pittsburgh; the Kew Observation Station, outside London, England; and the station on Mt. Stromlo, Australia.

1000 Enroll in Arts, Engineering Courses

Nearly a thousand young men and women have enrolled in the class centers sponsored this fall by the departments of engineering extension and arts and science extension of the College in fourteen towns and cities, M. T. Bunnell, supervisor of class centers in the Extension Service of the College, reported today. Tentative plans are under way to set up centers in seven other localities under these departments, and the expected total enrollment for the year is 1500.

Class centers are organized each year to teach subjects desired by the individuals in their own communities. The fourteen centers organized thus far have students studying 24 different subjects that range from shop arithmetic to calculus and include shorthand, typing, accounting, English, economics, chemistry, mechanics, electricity, thermodynamics, heat engines, radio engineering, refrigerating, and air conditioning.

Centers are located in Oil City, Sharpville, Sharon, Brackenridge, New Kensington, Jeannette, Monessen, Donora, South Fayette Township, Butler Township, Emporium, Altoona, Clairton, and Philadelphia.
