CINEMANIA

Lovable Frank Morgan comes to the Cathaum screen today in "The Perfect Gentleman" and carries on the rogue tradition of such pictures as "Naughty Marietta" and "Affairs of Cellini." He is supported by an English star of the vaudeville and legit stage, Cicely Courtneidge, and the young loce element is supplied by Heather Angel and Richard Waring. Others prominent in the cast are Herbert Mundin and Una O'Connor. Leo is certainly roaring louder these days for MGM than he ever did for PSC.

Morgan plays the part of a down-at-the-heels army officer who seeks relief from his impecunious state by going on the stage as a stooge to Miss Courtneidge. There are romantic complications, and occasional discords in the melody of love; but the fade-out finds Morgan possessed of more money than he had had in some time and in addition the lovely Cicely.

The dances are directed by Dave Gould, and include a balloon specialty number that broke some ten thousand in rehearsal. As if you cared! The picture was originally destined for the Broadway stage, but MGM pulled a fastie, and here it is.

"Sweet Surrender" is the name of the attraction at the Cathaum tomorrow, and it's so new the Cinemania hasn't a line on it. It is a musical with a flock of good tunes.

To be perfectly frank with you, we are much more interested in the short subject that has been included in the program. It's a two-reeler on the Dionne quintuplets. If you profess to be of the hard-berled school, touched only by scenes of death, disaster and destruction, then see this short and find out how sentimental you really are.

"Whipsaw," another late release, will be the Cathaum offering Monday and Tuesday. It features the virile Spencer Tracy and it has plenty of action.

"Top Hat" returns to the Nittany today and this most talked-of musical of the year will provide much in the way of entertainment for those who failed to see it before and for some who did. Astaire and Rogers have steadily gained favor with each successive musical they have appeared in, and this effort is tops.

Fox Film give the blood and thunder addicts another treat with the Nittany showing "Hard Rock Harrigan," tomorrow. George O'Brien, of the personality plus is starred and the ubiquitous villain of this drama of the mountain tunnel drillers is r'Fed Kohler. Irene Hervey is the love interest, and highly decorative, if I may say so.

The Record Crop

When Eleanor Powell combines her tap and vocal abilities with the rhythms of Tommy Dorsey's band, you have something. It's "Got A Bran' New Suit," from "At Home Abroad," and this recording is tops. Swell rhythm and trombone. On the other side is a Bea Lillie-ish version of a ditty titled "That's Not Cricket." Some good orchestral breaks and a tap finish that has its points. Victor—No. 25173

Two really good tunes get slightly less better treatment than they should at the hands of Red McKenzie and his Rhythm Kings. Al Donahue, a newcomer to the network and recording world, has put on wax two swellegant tunes for dancing. "Love Makes The World Go Round" is in neat tempo, and the reverse, "Twenty-Four Hours a Day," is a smooth bot of melody. Donahue is said to be the up and coming maestro of the day. We feel that this is extravagant, but we've been wrong before.

Bob Howard, dusky crooner, has gathered unto himself a small rhythm outfit and for a small group does pretty well. His piano and clarinet in "It's Written in the Stars," are the feature spots, while the piano gets the nod in the coupling, "Sugar Plum." His vocals lack the spontaneity of Waller's, but they have that husky appeal that Harlemaniacs dote on.

Decca pulls another ace from its

deck with the signing of Louis Armstrong. One of his first releases is "Got A Bran' New Suit," and it's a dazb. The vocal is typical and the trumpet breaks are on the nose. "I'm in the Mood for Love" is on the other side and he displays his mastery of the trumpet here in unmistakable terms. He is on his best behavior in the vocal of this one.

Since the Dorsey split meant two good bands instead of one we're in favor of it. Moreover, since the trombone is our favorite instrument, we've been leaning toward brother Tommy. And with the recording of "It's Written in the Stars," we think that his band is one of the best in the business of dispensing smart commercial stuff. This number is smooth from any angle and lovely Edythe Wright does the vocal. A catchy number that has plenty verve is on the other side: "One Umbrella For Two." Is good.
