

### Topography Project Included as Part Of NYA Work

Among the projects in operation this year by the N. Y. A. students is the photographic work for lecture services in the industrial engineering department.

The work was started last year as an F. E. R. A. project and consists of accurately constructed photographic equipment for use in taking pictures of machinery, workers, materials or copies of other pictures in books for enlargement by projection upon a screen for use as lecture illustrations.

A camera on a movable mounting takes the pictures on motion picture film, one at a time of the various subjects chosen, in the order desired for lecture. A motion picture camera with the roll of film in the same order, so that they can be carefully studied. Time and motion study are facilitated in this manner.

Machine work, carpentry work, photographic skill and inventive genius were all necessary for the work in developing the mechanical parts.

The work was directed by Prof. Joseph O. Hummel, of the department of industrial engineering, and some of his photographic apparatus is being used in this new lecture and class study equipment.

### Greenkeepers' Course To Start January 28

The School of Agriculture has issued announcement of the greenkeepers' short course to be held January 28 to February 21. The course is designed for people interested in fine turf production and maintenance problems.

Enrollment is limited to the first thirty applicants who return the questionnaire which was sent out. No special educational preparation is required, but some experience is necessary in the production and care of fine turf.

### Human Heads Feature Arouses Readers' Widespread Interest

In response to the widespread interest created by the story of Russell E. Stamm's presentation of shrunken human heads to the School of Mineral Industries, which appeared in the December 17 issue of the COLLEGIAN, the editors take pleasure in answering a few questions raised by readers.

Stamm, who is employed as an engineer for the Standard Oil company in Colombia, collected two specimens of human heads from the Indians in the jungles of Ecuador. He is one of the few men who has investigated the head-hunting aborigines and returned alive with specimens of their unique practice.

Process Unknown  
Head-hunting, although barred officially by various South American governments, is practiced by the natives in the dense jungle areas where the government seldom penetrates. The exact process which the natives use in reducing the heads to the size of a human fist remains unknown. But the shrinkage is accomplished so skillfully that the heads retain every feature in proportion.

Stamm was here on vacation from Colombia recently visiting his son, Roy P. Stamm '38, a student in the School of Mineral Industries, and is now on his way back to South America. Leaving on a southern cruise shortly before Christmas, Stamm is due in Colombia shortly.

### 2nd Extension Course Opens in Philadelphia

The second meeting of a fifteen-session course in laundry practice and customer relations, which has been arranged by the College extension services, will be held in Philadelphia tonight.

Under the supervision of J. Orvis Keller, assistant to the President in charge of extension, the course was planned for the Philadelphia Laundry Owners' Exchange.

At the first meeting on Monday, January 6, the work was outlined by Dr. Pauline B. Mack, of the textile chemistry department, and John R. Richards, director of arts and science extension. About 115 laundry representatives were present.


