Mineral Industries School Given \$2,400 for Petroleum Research

An appropriation of \$2,400 for research and experimental work by the School of Mineral Industries has been approved by the Pennsylvania Grade Crude Oil association and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania jointly. Each organization will supply half the amount, since the state matches any donation an industry may grant to be used in this type of work.

The fund is extended in the study of factors involved in the recovery of petroleum from reservoir rock by air or other gas drivers. It is hoped that the experiment may provide information which will save oil producers large sums of money that would otherwise be spent in development costs to accomplish the same end. It would also enable oil to be obtained that cannot be brought from the ground with present methods.

The Pennsylvania Grade Crude Oil association supplies the funds, since conducting experiments in laboratories is far cheaper than actually attempting to put the project in use. It is thought that the thousands of dol-

lars worth of oil taken from Pennsylvania's wells should not be drilled without providing some funds to be used for petroleum research and experimentation.

The work, which will be carried on by the Mineral Industries experiment station at this College, will be under the direction of Dr. Alfred W. Gauger, of the department of fuel technology, director of Mineral Industries research, assisted by Dr. Gerald L. Hassler, of the department of petroleum and natural gas.

This College has been selected for the project for various reasons. The research laboratories of the Mineral Industries experiment station here are well equipped. The services of specialists, not only in the petroleum field, but also in other lines, such as ceramics, fuel technology, geology, natural gas, and X-ray are available for consultation and advice. Other important advantages here are a large Mineral Industries library, analytical laboratories, and shops. The College provides electrical power, heat, light, water service, janitor service, and stenographic services.
