Humphrey Bogart, who had the stage role of the villainous killer, Duke Mantee, also plays the part in the screen version.

Miss Davis plays the part of a discontented girl who longs for freedom from the Arizona atmosphere and Howard is a disillusioned author who finally gives up his life that this girl may gain her freedom.

The story is laid in and about a filling station on the edge of the Arizona desert and is packed with exciting adventures in the form of family friction and later the arrival of a gang of gunmen who take over the place as a hide-out, having just participated in a massacre.
