

Relay Team Scores Upset at I. C. 4-A

3200 Meter Run Taken by State In Time of 7:56.1

Stiteler, Book, Downey, Baird Finish First In Relay Race.

Scoring what metropolitan sports writers termed "one of the stunning upset triumphs of the meet," Penn State's 3,200 meter relay team captured the Eastern Intercollegiate A. A. A. crown at the fifteenth annual indoor track meet at Madison Square Garden in New York City Saturday night.

Made up of Merle Stiteler, Frank Baird, Howard Downey, and Duverney Book, State's runners finished four yards ahead of Boston College, with Manhattan, the favorite and defending champion, fourth. State's time was 7:56.1.

Stiteler ran the first lap in 1:57.1, finishing a close third. Baird went

into the lead immediately, but was unable to hold it to the end, his time of 2:01 retaining third position. Howard Downey's 1:59.9 lap held third position and Book, running a beautiful anchor position, moved up to first place with time of 1:57.

Coach Charles "Chick" Werner was naturally well-pleased with the showing of the team, but despite their victory he was quick to point out that for the most part the runners were capable of even better performances than they turned in Saturday. The lead in the race alternated between Manhattan, N. Y. U., Harvard, Boston, and State, but the Nittany runners held it at the time when it counted most.

None of State's individual entries captured places. Adrian Markowitz was unfortunate in running in the same 600 meters trial with Eddie O'Brien, who later won the event. Pete Olego in the 3,000 meters suffered from his relative inexperience, being boxed several times and failing to finish up among the leaders. Bill Miller in the 35-pound weight event was up against the cream of the East and failed to place.

Swimmers Win 38-30 From Cornell Mermen

Penn State's first swimming team splashed through to their first intercollegiate victory Saturday by defeating Cornell 38-30. The Lion mermen captured five of the eight events.

Individual triumphs were registered by Jimmy Cumming in the 220-yard free-style; Ray Parks in the diving; Captain Dick Geiger, 150-yard back stroke; and Bob Dewalt in the 440-yard freestyle. The 480 yard relay combination of Bill Helriegel, John Walker, Bob Dewalt and Jimmy Cumming came through to score the first victory of the day.

Other point scorers for the Lions were Gil Burleigh, second in the back-stroke; Cumming, second in the 440; Gene Lesko, tie for second in the 220-yard breast-stroke; Helriegel and Walker, second and third respectively, in the 100-yard free-style; and Jerry Weinstein, third in the fifty-yard free-style.

The team as a whole showed marked improvement over previous performances. Cumming, Dewalt, Parks and Geiger, against good competition, swam well to win their specialties. Captain Cloyes of Cornell started by winning both the fifty- and 100-yard sprints, setting a new pool record for the latter event.

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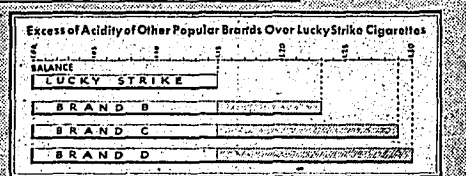
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
