

### Allentown Wins Swimming, Pottsville Gym, Westinghouse Volleyball at Title Meet Here

Three Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association championships were decided here Saturday when Allentown high school, for the second straight year, won the swimming title. Pottsville the gymnastics crown, and Westinghouse the volleyball championship.

Amassing a total of thirty-four points, Allentown won the second annual aquatic title with ease. Fifth Avenue of Pittsburgh placed second with 24 markers, while Eric Technical was third with 14½. What is believed to be a new national interscholastic record was established by Fifth Avenue's 150-yard medley relay team when they negotiated the distance in 1:25.8, two-tenths of a second lower than the old mark. Application will be made by the officials for recognition of the new standard. P. I. A. A. records were set in six other events.

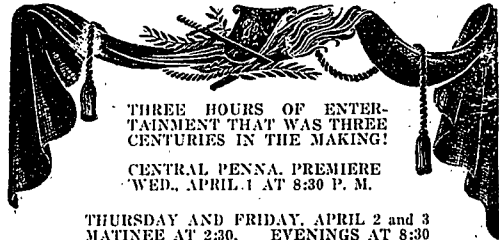
Without placing a single contestant in the first three positions, a well-balanced Pottsville high school gym team gained the first annual P. I. A. A. title. The winners scored 532 points, with Westinghouse of Pittsburgh second with 481, and Bristol third with 461. Westinghouse had three individual winners, while Bristol, Wilkesburg, and Latrobe won the other events.
