Lion Nine Meets West Virginia In Home Opener Today at 4:00

Take 6-5 Victory Over Western Maryland; Lose Ten Inning Navy Game, 2-1.

The Lion baseball team opens its home season against West Virginia on the New Beaver field diamond this afternoon at 4 p. m.

The Mountaineers will stay over to play the Lions Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock in a return engagement. This game will follow the freshman battle against Mercersburg Academy that will get under way at 12:15 o'clock.

With a 6-to-5 victory over Western Maryland and a 2-to-1 tenth inning defeat at the hands of Navy, the Lions began their current season in fairly promising fashion. The Western Maryland contest was played in Westminster, Maryland, on Friday, April 10; the Navy game in Annapolis on Wednesday, April 8.

To win the Western Maryland game the Nittany tossers were forced to push two runs across in the ninth inning. The score was 5-to-4 against them at the time. A single by Boho and a triple by O'Hora accounted for the first run. O'Hora crossed the platter with the second when the opposing right-fielder dropped Bielicki's fly. Big Wayne Vonarx hit a home run in the sixth inning.

The Navy setback was a heart-breaker for Frank Smith. He allowed only three hits and struck out ten Middle batsmen. However, he passed out seven walks—enough to lose the game. Navy's winning tally in the last half of the tenth was unearned. Left-fielder Matheson reached first when O'Hora threw low to first, but went all the way to third when Vonarx was slow in retrieving the ball. He then scored when Frank Smith's wild pitch bounded off Kornick's mit.

State's only score came in the first. With two outs, Boho singled on the ground over second. Captain Miller then tripled to deep left field, sending Boho home. Navy counted in the seventh when pitcher Eliot walked, advanced to second on a sacrifice, and

scored on a single by third-baseman Pratt. On his other three appearances at the plate, Eliot fanned.

Grid Team To Meet Lock Haven Here Tomorrow

Penn State football fans will get an advance showing of their 1936 grid-iron machine tomorrow when Coach Bob Higgins sends his men into a practice game with Lock Haven State Teachers' College on New Beaver field at 2 o'clock.

The game marks the high point of the most extensive spring football campaign in the Nittany Lions' history. Over fifty candidates have been practicing daily for three weeks, and Coach Higgins expects to continue until the end of April.

A line-up composed of new faces for the most part, will take the field tomorrow. Many of last year's lettermen are out for spring sports. A few of the veterans have been shifted to other positions, while the rest of the team consists of transfers and members of the freshman team.

Captain Chuck Cherundolo will start at center. The guard positions will be held down by Lou Barth and Johnny Economos, veterans, with Tony Sacco and Tor Toretti of the freshmen ready for service. Toretti played center for the yearlings, but has been shifted to guard by Higgins. Battaglio, freshman guard of two years ago, has returned to school and will probably play.

Dan De Marino, sophomore letterman, will be at one of the tackle posts, while Dean Hanley, a freshman, will be his running mate. Hanley is the outstanding line prospect to fill Captain Bob Weber's position.

Ends will be chosen from Carl Waugaman, who played freshman ball in 1934, but was out with an injured knee last season; Barantovich, freshman star; Joe Adessa, a transfer, and

Track Team Shows Improvement After Workouts During Holidays

Werner Hopes for Repeat Win in 2-Mile Relay At Penn Carnival; Weightmen Practice.

Despite the bad weather during the Easter holidays, which handicapped the work-outs of the squad of fifteen trackmen who remained here for practice, Coach "Chick" Werner, at the present writing, is fairly well pleased with the form that his charges are showing as they prepare for their first competition of the season at the Penn Relays at the end of this month.

While banking most heavily upon the championship 2-mile relay team to score a victory, "Chick" is also counting upon several other teams and individuals to capture places. The work of the weightmen, and of Captain Bill Miller, in particular, has shown a lot of improvement. Miller is now doing around 150 feet consistently—which is the equal of his best performance last year—and upon one occasion he got off a 164-foot throw, three feet short of the winner's distance at the Relays last year.

Hurdlers Show New Strength

Emmet Brown and Ian Murphy are both doing around 45 feet in the shot, while the latter, along with Tom Priolo and Cornman, have been bettering 130 in the discus. While these are not outstanding marks they are quite good, when the poor weather conditions are taken into consideration.

The hurdles, an event in which the varsity was weak last year, now look to be one of the strongest spots on the team and Werner may send a shuttle hurdle relay team to Philadelphia. Frankie Osterlund has been showing improved form, and he, together with Jim Redmond and Dave Bauer, from last year's yearlings, and Greg Thompson, a new varsity discovery, should make up a pretty formidable quartet.
