Sport's 2nd Season Under Thiel;
Last Year's Record Had
4 Wins, 2 Losses.

Putting the finishing touches on their play, the varsity lacrosse team is preparing for the season's opener against Penn in Philadelphia on Saturday. This will be the second season for the sport under Glenn "Nick" Thiel, former all-American at Syracuse.

Last season the team scored victories over Lehigh, 14-0, Pennsylvania, 11-3, Cornell, 10-6, and Lafayette, 19-1; but suffered defeat at the hands of Western Maryland, 14-3, and Army, 12-4. There remained from the squad for competition this year Robeson, Rumbaugh, Hof, Eisenman, Himoff, Conley, Hasek, Douthett, Foster, White, Eddy, Macario, McEwan, Snively, and captain-elect Gerber.

Seven numeral-men from last year's freshman outfit are promising varsity material and will see action in a majority of the scheduled games.
