State Track Men Defeat West Virginia in 1st Meet 81-to-54 on Beaver Field

Emmett Brown Sets New College Mark In Shot Put.

State's weight men, sweeping three events and breaking a college record in another, backed the runners solidly as a well-balanced track team piled up an 81-to-54 score against West Virginia here Saturday.

The Mountaineers made trouble, as was expected. It wasn't until the 850, when the meet was more than half over, that State went ahead, taking all places in this race, and then going on to score heavily in the field events.

Brown Breaks Record Emmett Brown pushed the shot past his own college record of 45 feet 11 1/2 inches, made last year, to set a new mark of 46 feet 2 1/2 inches.

Besides the half-mile, sweeps were made in the discus, javelin, and hammer. Ian Murphy, high scorer for State with nine points, spun the discus out 144 feet, only to falter a step outside the circle for a foul.

Johnny Johnson whipped the javelin further than his four teammates, who all qualified before any West Virginia man.

Gedwilas Wins Twice West Virginia's Gedwilas proved he was Olympic timber when he won both the mile and two-mile.

Pete Olexy led for three laps of the two-mile until Gedwilas swung past him.

Book came back after the mile and dug past Markowitz on the home stretch to win the half in 1:59.
