

Golfers Whip Penn, Lose To Georgetown, Princeton

Beat Red 5-4, After Bowing to Tigers, 6-3, Hoyas, 8-1, in Round Robin Play.

After 54 holes of tough navigation over the difficult hills and vales of the Columbia Country Club of Washington, D. C., the Lion golf team returned Sunday with a victory over Penn and losses to strong Princeton and Georgetown outfits.

The Penn victory made the trip worthwhile, and marked State's first victory in Eastern Intercollegiate Golf Association competition. The score was 5 to 4. The unfavorable Princeton and Georgetown scores were 6-to-3 and 8-to-1, respectively. Bernie Burkett, sophomore, provided State drama when he came through to win his match in each meet. Saturday morning he gained the Lions' only point when he ran down a birdie on the 21st hole to

win 1 up. On the extra 19th and 20th holes he was in trouble on his drives, only to come back with great recoveries.

Latent Talent Evincied
Coach Bob Rutherford revised the order of his line-up for the week-end, using Bennett, Stevenson, Burkett, Siegler, Coletti, and Albere in order named.

Bennett and Stevenson took their best ball match 3 and 1, with Stevenson defeating Morpeth, 3 and 1, and Bennett dropping to Bill King, 1 down on the 20th green. Burkett beat Peoles, 2 and 1, and Siegler bested Captain Nelson, 3 and 1, in the second foursome. They won the best ball, 3 and 1. Coletti and Albere dropped their matches to Cornell and Moore.

Princeton a Crack Outfit
Princeton was just too much for State Friday afternoon. Only Burkett and Siegler were able to master their opponents. Burkett won, 2 up, and Siegler took his man, 3 and 2. Together they won the best ball, 2 up. The others lost. Manager Luke Brightman said that after the match, the team picked Princeton to win the Intercollegiate title.

Georgetown was playing a bit over their heads Saturday morning, being hot enough to average scores of 73 against the Nittanymen's 77. The score of 8-to-1 looks bad, but the competition was really closer.

This being the first year State has entered the Eastern Intercollegiate competition, a little explanation as to round robin tournaments is necessary. There are two divisions of the conference, Northern and Southern. State is in the Southern, as are Cornell, Pitt, Georgetown, Penn, and Princeton. Two round robin tourneys determine the section winners.

The Plebes, who lost their first game to Mercersburg Academy two weeks ago, showed great improvement in the encounter Saturday afternoon. The past two weeks of practice under the direction of Coach Leo Houck, has strengthened the majority of the weak points of the team.

Dean Fencil, of the "Hilltop" school, hooked up with Bill Neal in a pitching duel that resulted in six strikeouts for the Seminary moundman, and five for the Lion hurler. Fencil walked five men, while Neal sent three to base on balls.

The Nittany batsmen started things moving in the first round when Ken
