

### Syracuse Track Team Will Enter Meet Here

O'Brien, in the sprints. Besides the dashes, he plays around with the half-mile and broad jump. Last week, in the dual meet with Army, he won the half in 1:57.5. When he broad jumps, he's usually good for 23 feet. Backing the runners heavily in the weight events will be "Tiny" Brown, the giant heavyweight who dropped the eastern intercollegiate boxing championship to Izzy Richter here last winter. He slings the hammer and shot put. Another field performer familiar to Lion fans is Mins-

vage, the football man, who, in his first efforts at pole vaulting, has been soaring over 11 feet.

Ray Reckmaek is another member of the colorful grid team who takes up javelin throwing when he packs the pigskin away. Hop O'Neil, twice intercollegiate champion and a leading Olympic aspirant, has been coaching Ray, who now hits 185 feet or better rather consistently.

The Hill team has some good distance men in Ed Crowder, Tom Lator, and Sentiff. Hamel, Mohr, Gould, and Webster are other middle distance runners. Pfeiffer and Parhiala run the hurdles.

#### State Looks for Trouble

Although the Lion track team has beaten Syracuse the last two years, despite Eddie O'Brien, "Chick" Werner sees plenty of trouble looming on Saturday. For one thing, Jim Redmond will probably still be on the sick list. Also, Dave Bauer, next best bet in the hurdles, will not be running this week-end.

Whatever the outcome of the meet, there will be some good races. When Downey and Stiteler meet O'Brien in the quarter, it'll be hard to keep the Beaver field cinders from bursting into flames. O'Leary and Book should also run scorchers against the gang of Syracuse distance men.

#### Freshmen Meet Cornell

Bill Miller, Himes, Koon and Feldman may find their hammer-throwing monopoly in danger when they run up against Slinger Brown. Brown should also push State's Brown and Murphy plenty in the shot put.

At the same time as the varsity meet, the freshmen will meet Cornell, coached by Joe Mangan, former intercollegiate champion and conqueror of Penn's Gene Venzke indoors this season. Mangan has his usual adept squad, featuring strong distance runners.

This will be the freshmen's last meet of the season, and on paper they look to be the better team. They should win by a fairly wide margin. With such men as Aikman, Hazzard, and Henderson in the distance events; McKillips, Carpenter, and Fritz in the shorter races; and Hanley, Clark, Miller, Patrick, Sandham, and Poticher in the field events, they rank as high as any freshman track squad in the East.

### INTRAMURAL HIGHLIGHTS

**TRACK**  
With four events left unfinished because of a sudden rain, the A. T. O. track team led with 26 points in the meet that started Wednesday afternoon. The four events to be run off next Tuesday are the javelin and discus throws, the high jump, and the pole vault. Phi Delta Theta placed second with 20 points, while Sigma Nu, Beta Sigma Rho, Beta Theta Pi, last year's winner, D. U., and S. A. E. trailed the leaders.

The closest meets of the day were in the 100-yard dash and the quarter mile. Bill Denise, Sigma Nu, won the century with a gain of about one foot over George Haines, D. U. The time was 10.2. In the 440, Mitchell, Phi Delta, stood off a late charge by Larry Harper, S. A. E., to win by a yard in 54.6. Mitchell also ran the anchor lap on the winning Phi Delta relay team. Other good performances were registered by Haines in the broad jump and Scott, another Phi-Delt, in the hammer throw.

The A. T. O. trackmen won the first three places in the low hurdles. From that time on they picked up enough seconds and thirds to maintain their lead. The Betas lost a good chance to repeat their last year's victory when Ray Warnock, running anchor on their relay team, failed to overtake the Phi-Delt man after nearly passing him on a curve. With the Phi-Delt not represented in the high jump or the pole vault, the A. T. O.'s face only a mathematical chance of losing their lead in the Tuesday afternoon meet.

The tournament in volleyball has been completed up to the final game, which will be played between the Beta Sigma Rho team and the Phi Sigma Delta boys. Neither of these two teams have been defeated in any games of the competition.
