Appreciation of the cooperation given by fraternities in entertaining high school students last week-end was expressed today by Bob Higgins, football coach. Higgins also said that he was sure that the other varsity coaches echoed his appreciation.

The Lion football coach referred to approximately 200 high school athletes who were guests of the College at the wrestling, boxing, and basketball contests Saturday. Many of the visitors hope to enter Penn State next fall.

The aid of the fraternities was asked, Higgins pointed out, at a time when the reputation of the College depended upon the entertainment of the guests. He foresaw no further situation so acute during the remainder of the semester.

Demand For Teachers Strong, Says Broyles

ship-boxing and wrestling teams—one rarely finds a great deal said about either. Of course there are a great many factors concerned in the press' apparent lack of interest in these teams. Basketball is the major college winter sport. Stories from the winter training quarters of the major league baseball teams rate a big play. Then, there is the difficulty of getting stories wired into the big papers in time to make the state editions.

It is only when correspondents are sent here by the papers that sports like boxing and wrestling are given the coverage they deserve. The New York Times sends Lincoln A. Warden here to cover the boxing intercollegiate, for instance, and stories of State's supremacy in eastern boxing circles are spread all over the sports page of that sheet the next day. Collier's sends Kyle Crichton here to write an article on college boxing with the result that thousands of readers of this popular magazine are able to learn a little what this college boxing business is all about.

College boxing and Penn State in particular got about the nicest boost from any paper recently when Charley Reilly, sports editor of the Easton Express, columned about his impressions of the State-Navy meet last week. In a region where sports fans hear little more than chauvinistic praise for Lafayette's mediocre football and basketball teams or Lehigh's wrestling team, it is comforting to find that one sports writer lets his readers know that tucked away in the mountain fastnesses of this state is a place where college boxing and wrestling are at their best.

Reilly draws an interesting contrast between pro and college boxing and says, "When it comes to system, the professionals can take a few lessons from the intercollegiate. . . college boxing free from suspicion. It was the other picture; boxing without the bag; boxing worth bragging about."

Forty-five students have just been admitted into the upper division of the School of Education on the basis of examinations given recently.

This is the second group to be admitted to the upper division since it has been in existence. The group includes twenty from the lower division, seven from the junior colleges of Pennsylvania, six from the undergraduate teaching centers of Pennsylvania, five from the Pennsylvania teachers' colleges, three from several colleges of the state, and four from other schools on the campus. Three were refused admittance to the upper division for failure to meet the necessary qualifications, and action was deferred on seven applicants who had not yet earned sufficient credits.
