

Pol. Science Majors May Attend Meeting

In preparation for the Intercollegiate Student Conference on Government at Harrisburg on April 3 and 4, Dr. Jacob Tanager and Prof. John T. Law, of the department of political science, announced today that all students majoring in political science were eligible to attend.

The department of political science and Pi Lambda Sigma, pre-legal fraternity, are sponsoring two classes a week for students interested in participating in the "model legislature." The group will meet in room 22, S. L. A., on Monday and Wednesday at 4 o'clock.

The group will prepare bills for legislation which they feel the government of Pennsylvania should accomplish. Six committees are now at work on the problems of labor, social welfare, local government, education, natural resources, and public utilities. William J. Scarlett '37 is chairman of the group, while Marshall K. Evans '38 is regional director.

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The Record Crop

The music eds would say it is a sacrifice for TOMMY DORSEY to do Rubenstein's *Melody in F* as a jazz number. I'll ask them to forget the song has such a connotation and hear a swell band do a swell job on a swell tune. Tommy has augmented his boys with Bunny Berigan and with Bud Freeman (trumpet and tenor sax respectively). The side is as nice a job as the reverse. *Who'll Buy Me Violas?* a less delicate rendition but equally as interesting. (Victor 25519)

The brother, JIMMY DORSEY, kidnaps two tunes to tin pan alley, *Chicken Reel* and *Finecut Fumietta*. These are nice for variety but kind of screwy.

But the GOODMAN QUARTET proves you don't have to borrow off of the alley because in their *Tea for Two* on Victor 25529 this ancient Youman's song is promanaded like a queen. Take a minute off to be educated and listen to Piano Wilson's left hand. You've probably heard the other side. *Ramin' Wild*, ethered from Hotel Pennsylvania and realize superlatives are unnecessary.

When I heard LIONEL HAMP-TON had borrowed some of the boys from Benny and done some recording, I was excited. The result I heard. *Last Affair* and *The Mood I'm In* are a tiny bit disappointing swing-istically. The disc, Victor 25527, is a very smooth ensemble backing the vibraphone. I've heard Lionel do a better vocal, but very seldom a better instrumental rendition.

Decca 1049 and Bluebird 6771 are four sides of LOUIS ARMSTRONG imitating Satchmo. Decean, *When Ruben Swings the Cuban* (with Jimmy Dorsey) and *Red Nose* are typical of his "scared" attack that is only noticeable on discs. *High Society* and *I've Got a Right to Sing the Blues* are better and certainly with few trumpet rivals on modern records. The last has a nice vocal.

Helme Prepares Exhibit Schedule

Sculpture Display Consisting Of Contemporary Work Will Open Series

A complete schedule of art exhibits which will be held throughout the semester has been announced by Prof. J. Burn Helme, of the department of architecture.

During the first two weeks of April a sculpture exhibition consisting of the original works of well-known contemporary sculptors will be held. At that time there will also be an exhibition of the paintings by a group of Pennsylvania wonder painters, and a display of woodblock prints in color.

The fourth and last group of contemporary American paintings reproduced in facsimile, and a collection of prints of many media, will be shown during the last two weeks of April. Paralleling the foregoing exhibitions, a display representing the twelve architectural schools in this country which make up the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture, will be held.

For the first two weeks of May there will be held the second annual show displaying the works by artists of central Pennsylvania, and along with this there will be the annual show of the Philadelphia Society of Etchers and Graphic Artists.

Climaxing the semester, there will be an exhibit of works by Mrs. Lucie Lederer, local artist, whose paintings have been favorably received by critics in the past three years, and a display representing the work completed by students during the college year.
