Ord Fink topped Walker, of Western Maryland, to win the 165-pound crown. Kociubinsky' decided Danielson, of Yale, in the preliminaries and won over Tony Ortenzi, Western Maryland, when the latter suffered a cut eye in the second round of their semi-final clash. Kinsella of Columbia in 1:37, and Clarke of Yale in 6:48 with an arm and leg scissors to enter the finals against Lehigh's Wells. Ross had the upper hand in the meet until Wells defaulted because of an injured knee. Clarke won the second place medal while Wells' automatically took third. Captain O'Dowd's crack at the title was nearly frustrated when, after gaining 3:17 minutes over Toll of Princeton, he went into the semi-finals against Sterngold of Lehigh to be declared the loser by a time advantage of 1:11. However, Bob Siegler, State's manager, had noticed a discrepancy in timing and he asked for an investigation. The matter was submitted to the referees who voted two to one for extra periods, but before the bout was arranged the matter was submitted to the respective team representatives and the vote was eight to one for continuation.

At 10 o'clock on Saturday morning both wrestlers stepped on the mats. The teams' score was deadlocked at six points each, while both teams had four men eligible for the finals. O'Dowd was declared the winner by the decision of the presiding
