Math Meetings Set For State

September Sessions Will Mark First Time National Groups Have Met Here

Dr. F. W. Owens, head of the department of mathematics, announced recently that the American Mathematical Society and the Mathematical Association of America will hold their summer meetings at the Pennsylvania State College, next September 7-10.

The American Mathematical Society is interested in the advancement of mathematics while the Mathematical Association of America is an organization of faculty concerned in teaching methods. Both these groups held separate meetings several times during the year within sections of the country, and they meet together annually in a national convention which this year is to be held here for the first time.

More than 400 mathematicians from virtually every state in the Union will attend the sessions, Dr. Owens estimated. Professors Owens, Orrin Frink, and

C. C. Wagner, of the faculty; L. L. Dines, of the Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pittsburgh; and T. R. Hollcroft, of Wells College, Aurora, N. Y., comprise the committee on local arrangements for the American Mathematical Society's sessions. The same group with the substitution of W. D. Cairns, of Oberlin, for Professor Hollcroft, will make similar plans for the Mathematical Association of America.

Prof. John von Neuman, of the Institute for Advanced Study, will give the colloquium lectures on "Continuously Differentiable Manifolds."

Student Arrested in Open-Air Celebration

Mystery enshrouds the borough jail today after a post-Easter "celebration" by a half-dozen students at the intersection of Allen street and Beaver avenue, Wednesday night culminated in the arrest of one of the students by Officer M. L. Kauffman. Police declined to reveal the name of the student, who was confined to jail on a charge of disorderly conduct and resisting arrest.

Kauffman claims he ordered the students to get off the street. Five responded, he said, but one held his ground. When he attempted to seize him, the student decided to speed away. Finally caught it is claimed the student resisted Kauffman's efforts to force him into the police car.

Once within the jailhouse, the student was spurred to a final, desperate flight for freedom. A pair of handcuffs blocked him. Then, for greater safety's sake, a few bars were placed in front of him.
