Penn State's trackmen face a busy week-end, with both a dual meet with Juniata and the final tryouts for the Penn Relays appearing on the schedule. The Juniata meet will be run off this afternoon at 4 o'clock, while the tryouts will take place tomorrow at 2 o'clock.

Little is known about the track team which Coach Mike Snyder will bring up from Juniata College, but it is expected that State will win handily, even in view of the relatively poor performances turned in last Saturday in the preliminary tryouts.

Nittany Baseball Nine Meets West Virginia In Week-end Tussles

Simoncelli To Start Opener of 2-Game Series Today; Smith Suffers Sore Arm

Victorious in two of its three starts, Penn State's baseball team begins its first home stand at New Beaver field at 4 o'clock this afternoon, when it meets West Virginia's Mountaineers in the opener of their annual two-game series. The second tussle is billed for 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, immediately following the wind-up of the baseball clinic.

Smarting from the stinging defeat absorbed at Princeton last Monday, the Lion batsmen aim to emerge from their hitless spell and push the nine back into the win column. Meanwhile, the Mountaineers, protecting a record of three victories and one defeat, are pointing to avenge the double-dribbling handed them by the Nittany Lions last year.

Simoncelli to Pitch

Slated to hurl today's contest is the southpaw fireball artist, Benny Simoncelli, who subdued George Washington with an eight-hit performance in the season opener two weeks ago. Co-captain Frank Smith, handicapped by a sore arm, may be forced to witness both games from the sidelines. Should Smith fail to whip his arm into shape, Coach Joe Bedenk will send sophomore Joe Didingier to the mound. Didingier chalked up four decisions as a member of the freshman team last season.

Only one other starting assignment remained in doubt today. Either Don Crossin or Ray Brake will start in right field, depending upon the West Virginia mound choice. Bedenk expects to use Crossin only against left-handed pitching. Sol Miehoff in left and Joe Adessa in center will round out the outfield.

Co-captain Howard Downey will appear in both the 220 and his favorite, the 440-yard run. In this latter race, Downey will be seeking to beat the college record of 48.3 seconds. Downey has run the distance in the 47 second class twice, but in neither case did he win the race.

Adrian Markowitz and Chuck McKillips are also slated to appear in the 440 with Downey. Burt Aikman is the only certain starter in the half-mile run. Pete Olexy will run in either the one-mile or the two-mile run, probably the one-mile. Charley Pierce and Len Henderson will run in the two-mile event.

Bauer, Jim Redmond, Greg Thompson, and Miller Frazier are the possible participants in the low and high hurdles. Bob Clark is a sure bet in the pole vault, and Redmond and Vic Sandham will take care of the high jump. Clark almost cleared 13 feet during practice this past week. The State record is only 12 feet four inches.

Mike Brown, Tom Priolo, and Dean Hanley will bear the brunt of the weight events.
