

#### College Library Gets 🕟 **Electrical Collection**

Installation of a \$4500 machine for testing the strength of metals has been completed by the School of Mineral Industries. Operated by hydraulic pressure, it is the latest production of its type and the third one to be installed in this country. The School has, also equipped its microscopy laboratory with metallurgical microscopos, desks, and accessories. A collection of 400 books 100 col A collection of 400 books, 100 college studies, 400 periodicals, and approximately 80 pamphlets chiefly in the field of electrical engineering, has been donated to the College Library by Dr. Dugald C. Jackson '85, professor emeritus of electrical engineering at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology rechnology.

Taken from his private library Doctor Jackson's gift contains many original and early editions as well as more recent books concerning elec-trical engineering. In addition, Doctrical engineering. In addition, Doctor Jackson has sent a hibliography of his own extensive publications.

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
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
