Proposed Amendment

The proposed amendment to the Constitution, Section C, paragraphs (a) and (b):

(a) The one-year residence rule

may be waived in the case of a trans fer from a junior college, provided that the certifying college requires as high scholastic standards of the transfer student as it requires of its resident students under similar con-

ditions.

(b) And, provided, that the certifying senior college counts all athletic competition in the junior collegust, as if it had taken place in the certifying college itself. It is understood that any competition with a team of another school or college that the student had within 12 months fol-lowing his enrollment in a junior col-lege shall count as freshman compe-
