State Holds 4th PIAA Track Meet

Schoolboy Runners to Perform Here Saturday; AA Books Will Admit Holders

The fourth annual P.I.A.A. track meet will be conducted here this week end. For the first time, college students will be admitted free, upon presentation of their A.A. books. In past years, there has been an admission charge.

The meet itself has grown until now it is recognized as one of the largest high school meets in the East. Several of the members of the present freshman team have come into prominence as the result of performances made in this meet last year.

Nick Vukmanic won the javelin throw with a toss of 206 feet 10 inches. Frank Maule cracked John Woodruff's mile record when he ran the distance in 4 minutes 38 seconds. Bob Hutchings finished second in the low hurdles race two years ago and last year ran on the Erie Strong Vincent relay team which broke the old state record.

Roger Maurer and Burt Aikman also came here after winning state titles in the meet here. Maurer won the broad jump last year with a leap of 22 feet 2 3/4 inches while Aikman won

the 880-yard run two years ago in 2 minutes flat.

Most of the attention this year will be centered on Barney Ewell, colored flash from Lancaster high school. Saturday, in the qualifying district meet, Ewell ran the 100-yard dash in the record time of 9.6 seconds. His time for the 220 was 21.3, also better than the state record. In addition, Barney walked off with first place in the broad jump.

Dick Belyea, junior at Upper Darby high school, will also be very much in the public eye. Belyea ran the half-mile in 1:57.4 Saturday. This is the fastest time that has ever been turned in for this distance by a Pennsylvania schoolboy.
