## Pitt, Chicago Lifted From '38 Schedule

Ithaca Is Selected For Intercollegiates March 11, 12

Lacrosse Ten To Open Against Army April 9

Penn State's eastern intercollegiate championship wrestling team will be seen at home four times, against formidable opponents, according to the 1938 schedule announced today by George W. Jarden '38, manager. At the same time, the varsity and freshman lacrosse schedules were announced by Robert B. Blum '38, manager.

Pitt and Chicago have been replaced on the grapplers' list by Harvard and Michigan. The matmen have met Harvard twice before, winning both times. The same result has come out of the two previous meetings with Michigan.

Just as last year, the wrestlers will open against Princeton, to whom they dropped a close match by a 13-15 score. This season the meeting will take place here on January 15.

The wrestling intercollegiates will be held at Ithaca, March 11 and 12. Besides the four home matches and the intercollegiates, the Lions will meet Lehigh, Navy, and Michigan in away matches.

The varsity lacrosse men will meet eight opponents this season, as compared with nine last. Only three of the games will be played at home. There is one newcomer on the schedule, Lafayette, whom the Blue and White have defeated on three previous occasions.

Army will be here to open the season on April 9, and Cornell and Swarthmore will be the other two home opponents. Both freshman games will be played here.

## New IM Football Rules Expected

9-Man Team Adopted in June; Board To Open Up Game, Use More Passes

Adoption of a new set of rules aimed to "open up" intramural football and eliminate injuries is expected at a meeting of the Intramural Board this afternoon at 4 o'clock, it was indicated yesterday by an authoritative source.

Meeting last June, the Board accepted a proposal to discard the 11-man team and substitute a nine-man team. The action came on the heels of an editorial in the Collegian stressing the huge number of injuries incurred last fall in intramural football.

When it convenes today for the first time this semester, the Board is expected to adopt the set of rules used by nine-man teams at other institutions.

Changes Forseen  
In line with its policy to eliminate body contact as much as possible, the Board is expected to banish the crouching line and make every player eligible to receive a forward pass.

Commenting on the situation, Eugene C. Bischoff, faculty advisor to the Board, stated they were in favor of anything that would open up the game and make more of a forward-passing game out of it.

Meanwhile, preparations for the fall intramural season will begin with the close of the fraternity rushing season. Besides football, cross-country, horseshoes, and golf putting are on the fall calendar.

Chairman of the Board is David M. Ramsey, with Bud Gordon, secretary; Jack Fair, fall manager; Dale Boyer, winter manager; Joseph Weibel, spring manager, and Bob Smith, non-fraternity representative.

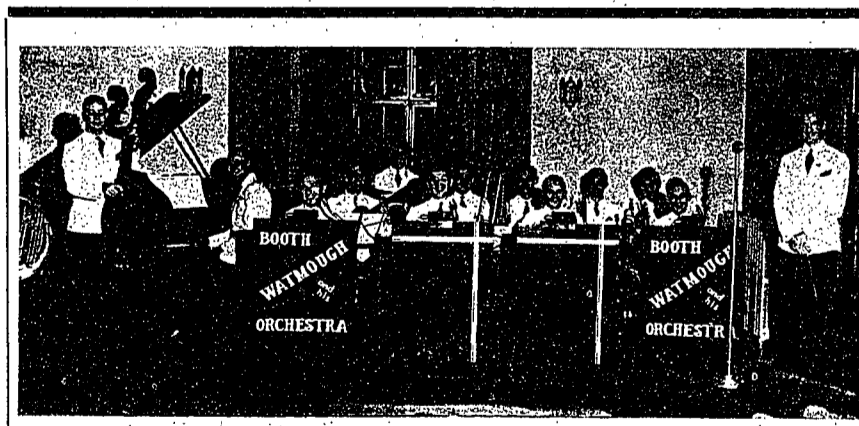
