sult in a 10-yard penalty under the same ruling.

To avoid bodily contact as much as possible, the Board added to its adoption of a five-man line last June the elimination of the crouching stance in the line, the prohibition of the use of hands or arms to push or hold an opponent, and the elimination of hip-and-shoulder blocking. Blocking "as used in basketball" will be permitted. One-hand touching is regarded as legal.

Projection of the "dead ball" ruling into cases concerning fumbles and kicks also adds flavor to the Board's "safety first" policy. "When the ball is fumbled it is dead at that point and remains in the possession of the team fumbling the ball," one of the rules states.

"On any kickoff, punt, dropkick or placekick, only the team receiving—not the side kicking—can secure possession of the ball," another rule adds. On any kick, the receiving team is given possession of the ball, regardless of fumbles, at the point where it first touched the ground. "Kick formation" must be called to legalize punts from scrimmage. Toss of a coin will decide the opening kickoff, with team scored upon given the choice of subsequent kickoffs.

Any kick or incomplete pass crossing the defensive team's goal line will be ruled a touchback. A "safety" without any score—will be called when the "attacking team is responsible for grounding the ball behind its own goal line." In such cases, the ball will be given to the defending team on its opponents' 20-yard line.

With the exception of the safety, scoring rules will remain intact. Twenty yards will be the four-down yardage distance. Twenty-minute halves, with five-minute intermission, will be used. In case of a tie at the end of the regulation time, each team will be given an additional four downs, starting from the 50-yard line. Score or yardage gained will determine the winner.

Spiked shoes will be prohibited, but cleats will be permissible. No special protective devices, such as shoulder pads and guards, will be allowed. Physical examination cards will be required.
