College Library Gets Valuable Newspapers

The College library has secured, through gift and purchase, a valuable collection of nearly a hundred volumes of Northumberland county newspapers from Dr. Walter Hertzog, director of American historical research for the board of education of the City of Los Angeles, and formerly a resident of Shamokin.

Because many of the files are the only ones in existence, the papers are very valuable and have been stored in a safe deposit vault in Los Angeles for 25 years. Covering the period thoroughly from 1850 to 1889, they contain valuable source material on Central Pennsylvania in the Civil War years, the financial crisis of the Grant administration, the labor troubles in the coal mines, and the Molly Maguires.
