

# LION HARRIERS SHUT OUT PITTMEN, 15-0

## State Cubs Bow For Third Loss As Orange Wins, 19-0

Marching 85 yards to take the lead in the opening six minutes, the Syracuse freshman football team defeated Penn State's Cubs, 19-0, for their third consecutive loss on New Beaver field Saturday afternoon.

Stan Johnson, hard-plunging Orange fullback, led the Syracuseans to their third victory of the season against no losses. Johnson's bull-like rushes through wide holes opened by his forward line were difficult for the

## Complete Team Crosses Line Before 1st Panther; Yearlings Take First Loss

### Meet Puts End To Dual Season Of 2 Wins, 2 Setbacks

With a finish that made the official finish sheet look like the roster of the Penn State team, all nine runners in the meet against the so far unbeaten varsity Pittmen crossed the line before the first Panther arrived, giving the Lions a perfect score victory, 15-0.

The meet Friday on the local course marked the end of the current season of dual meets for the Lions, the second Penn State shut-out victory of a season of two wins and two losses. There remains to climax the harriers' season the I. C. A. in New York next Monday, in which the best runners of college teams throughout the country will compete for intercollegiate honors.

### Lions Lead Throughout

From the time the runners crossed the highway back of Rec hall, six Nittany harriers gained the leading positions which they maintained throughout the grind to the tape, leading the Pittsburgh opponents by a good margin. Capt. Pete Olesky and Frank Maule set the pace to pound in together in 27 minutes and 37 seconds.

The first man of the Pitt combination of Albert Zamborski, Casimir and Benedict Kopeck, Bob Cogswell, Paul Clifford, Jack Emans, and Allan McKee to come across and place first among his teammates but tenth in the meet was Casimir Kopeck in 28.49. He was followed by teammates Zamborski, Benedict Kopeck, and Cogswell. The race was run on a cold, windy day and was accompanied by a slight drizzle. Point scores for Penn State were: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, equalling 15; for Pittsburgh: 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, equalling 40. This was Pitt's fifth dual meet of the season—all previous four having been victories for the Panthers.

### Pitt Squad Marks 3rd Frosh Tilt

On the other hand the yearling harriers lost their last tilt of the season to a Pitt seven that was just a little too fast for them. The score: Pitt-23; State-32.

The freshman meet, run immediately preceding that of the varsity, was a bit more interesting and exciting than the varsity meet as the final outcome was not so certain after the half-way mark. The loss for Penn State followed an undefeated season marked by a 22-33 win over the Cornell cubs and a 21-34 victory over the small Orange team.

### Smith Leads Again

Bill Smith, Penn State ace, was again the first to cross the finish line as he has been in all other meets of his college running career. He traversed the smaller course in 15 minutes and 35 seconds, followed closely by Pittmen, Edwin Ammerman, in 15.48, Paul Roelen, in 15.52, and Walter Sterner, in 15.58.

In fifth place arrived Milt Keiser with the time of 16.01, followed by Al Bulner of Pitt and Penn Stater John Greiner. In eighth and tenth were Panther cubs Bill Nurni and Frank McCabe, while in ninth and eleventh places came Lions Joe Foley and Jim Williams.

### Pitt Holds Records

Among the Panthers who defeated the Lion freshmen, Edwin Ammerman, who came in second this time, has held the championship for the state of Pennsylvania; Bill Nurni was the first man on the state championship-winning team; while Frank McCabe has beaten Nurni in practice. Walter Sterner was second man in the National Championship in his senior high school year, while Paul Roelen was Ohio state champ.

### Movies of Penn Game To Be Shown Tonight

Moving pictures of the Penn State-University of Pennsylvania football game will be shown in the Chemistry Amphitheatre at 7:30 o'clock tonight. There will be no admission charge.
