Chosen as spokesman of the group which interviewed the French Premier Dr. Champlin conversed with the statesman for over 20 minutes. Chautemps praised America's pursuit of peace, and turning to his own country, stated that the enlightened French youth do not need and would not tolerate registration. In ideals, French youth are very similar to the young people of this country, Dr. Champlin quoted the Premier as saying.

Swinging to England, the group gained an audience with silver-haired ex-Premier Lloyd George. The Englishman still showed vestiges of a once powerful personality, according to Dr. Champlin. George discussed the political issues facing Europe today.

Unlike the Germans, the people of the Soviet hate their past. Their attitude, Dr. Champlin said is: "We have no history; we are making history now."

Passive, conservative in taste, but progressive in ideals, Stalin, an overwhelmingly popular leader, perfectly reflects the philosophy of the Russian people.

The European trip was Dr. Champlin's third since 1934.
