Lions Brighten Outlook For Annual Penn Relays

Fine performances by a quartet of Nittany millers, Bill Smith in the 3,000 metre run, and Nick Vukmanic and Dan Murphy in the field events highlighted Saturday's true trials to boost Lion hopes for the 44th annual Penn Relay carnival in Philadelphia next Friday and Saturday.

Norm Gordon led Coach Werner's group of millers preparing for the four mile relay event, beating Frank Daule, Bill Grist, and Charlie Pierce across the line in four minutes and 24 seconds. All four men ran under the 4:30 mark with Pierce finishing fourth in 4:27.

Possibility of the Lions scoring heavy in the field events was increased by Nick Vukmanic, who set a new State javelin record of 213 feet 5 1/2 inches against Michigan State, tossed the spear 205 feet. Walt Shea heaved 187 feet 2 inches and Tom Prieto 171 feet 2 inches. Dan Murphy tallied two firsts in the discus and shot put. Vukmanic scoring second in the former event.

Bill Smith, winner of the I. C. 4-4 freshman cross-country championship last fall and ace distance runner, prepared for the special 3,000 metre invitation race with Joe McChesky, Don Lash, and several of the country's other great ones, by stepping through an 8:56 3,000.

In the closely-competed varsity dash trials, Will Sutton took first in both the 100 and 220. With Kalman-owicz still resting a bad leg muscle, Sutton barely edged Paul Stoller, Bob Miller, and Bill Engel, in a very close finish to the century. Sutton easily bested the field in the 220 with Miller and Engel running second and third.

Hurdlers Miller Frazier and Dave Bauer led for honors over the high jumpers, each winning one race. One or the other will compete in the 120 high hurdle invitation with 10 of the nation's best.

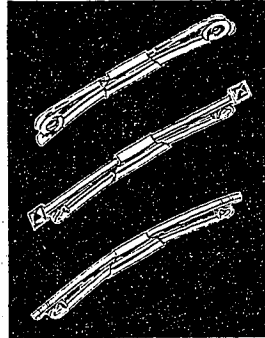
Remaining varsity events gave Tom McCall a victory over Art Haigh and Harry Wear in the 440. Bob Clark and George Jackson leaped 12 feet to deadlock in the pole vault. Hilliard Himes heaved the hammer 133 feet to outdistance Jack Fair and Dan Erhard.

Dick Gaines, Lester Cohen, and Al Grady led the freshmen sprinters in the 100. Harry Kjellman recorded the best time in the 440 for the first-year men, as Harold Kniekerbocker won the other heat. Van Hartman, Walt Hosterman, Jim Williams, and Kjellman may compete in the mile relay as the Lion's only yearling entry.
