Alpha Phi Delta Wins I. M. Bowling Crown Over Alpha Sigma Phi

Overcoming a 78 pin deficit, the Alpha Phi Delta bowlers, second-half winners, captured the Intramural Bowling championship Tuesday, edging Alpha Sigma Phi by 34 pins. The victors tallied 2221 pins for the three game series while Delta Sigma Phi brought up the rear with 2090.

Alpha Sigma Phi, Tuesday first-half tournament winners, set the pace in the first game with 737 pins. Delta Sigma Phi, Thursday first-half leaders, bowled 699 to take second place at the start.
