S.P.E.E. Gives Sackett Lamme Prize In Texas

The Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education awarded Dr. Robert L. Sackett, dean emeritus of the School of Engineering, the Lamme medal at the organization's annual meeting at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas Thursday

Provided for in the will of Benjamin G. Lamme, former chief engineer for the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company, the medal is awarded annually for accomplishment in technical teaching or in actual advancement in the art of engineering field.

It was the second honor awarded Dr. Sackett in the past year His alma mater, University of Michigan, gave him the degree of doctor of engineering for his work in the field of engineering education at its 1937 June commencement.

The Pennsylvania Grade Crude Oil association will sponsor a course giving the latest technical information on lubricants and gasolines for oil jobbers beginning Monday and ending July 15 The Petroleum and Refining laboratory is cooperating with the association in presenting the chemistry of lubricants

Dr. Merrill R. Fenske, head of the laboratory, will not be able to give his lectures as originally planned and in his place Prof. Floyd L. Carnahan will speak

Dean Frank C. Whitmore, chemistry and physics, will lecture on the topic, "Hydrocarbons," a talk he has given all over the country

The purpose of the course as outlined by the Bulletin of the association is to give these oil men a technical background about fifteen "students" are expected

Tonight's affair is jointly sponsored by the Summer School Social Committee and three of the girl dormitories, Delta Sigma Phi, Sigma Nu, and Sigma Pi In the past, the Summer School conducted the weekly all-College dances by themselves, but since the dormitories felt that the burden of holding two dances in their houses was too heavy, they have asked to jointly sponsor dances in Recreation hall which will count as one of their house dances

Joseph J. Lowden, professor of education and chairman of the dancing program, has been negotiating to bring a nationally known band to the campus for the weekly dances Howard Gale Harrisburg, has been playing for a series of weekly coast-to-coast broadcasts over the Columbia Broadcasting System

Lowden said that if enough interest was shown in these dances, he would hold one on Commencement night, August 4

Weather, Strike—But Building Program Kept On Schedule

Despite the recent rains and jurisdictional labor dispute, the work on the mine buildings by McCloskey and Company is on schedule for completion by the end of January, it was learned from authoritative sources yesterday.

The carpenters walked out last Thursday because the union claimed laborers were encroaching when the latter pulled concrete forms up to the steel and fastened them.

Although their contract calls for completion by June 30, 1939, the construction has been so arranged and carried out that the Philadelphia contractor expects to leave town before the first semester ends

Should this be possible, which in all case it seems likely, it will mean that the College's semi-annual headache of finding enough classrooms will be solved

Steel For Liberal Arts Steel for the Liberal Arts building is now being made ready for putting in place as the final foundation adjustments are made This building was originally scheduled to be completed first but rock formations have made the delay However, it will be at least two more weeks before the first column can be set in the Chemistry and Physics building and the Electrical engineering unit

French Group Opens Annual Studies Here

State Body Is One Of Four In Country; Ernest Is Head

Approximately seventy-five persons are enrolled in the annual summer Institute of French Education, Director M. Frederic Ernst stated yesterday The Institute here is one of four of its kind in this country.

The purpose of the summer sessions is to give to the students fluency in the French language while continuing with their academic work in the tongue So often, persons have gone to France to learn to speak the language and found themselves not well enough prepared

The Institute acts as a liaison between the intermediately good linguists and the more perfected ones of the native country The "no-English" rule of the session is a step towards the everyday use of the language

Michaud To Lecture M. Regis Michaud, professor of French literature at the University of Illinois and a member of the Legion of Honor, will give several lectures M. Michaud has written several books and has translated works of Sinclair Lewis into his native tongue

July 14th, Bastille Day for the French Republic, will be celebrated by a dinner given in Ivins Hall The guest of honor will be the French consul to Philadelphia Other honored guests will be Dean Emeritus Will Grant Chambers, education, and Dean Marion R. Tibau, education

The majority of the students come from New York and Pennsylvania, but twelve states are represented by its enrollment

Six Faculty Men Granted Leaves

Six members of the faculty have been granted leaves of absence by the board of trustees, Pres Ralph D. Hetzel stated recently

Prof. Sylvester K. Stevens, history, has been granted an extension of his leave for the next academic year at the request of the Pennsylvania Historical Commission Prof. Charles S. Wyand, economics, was granted a year's leave for graduate work at Columbia University

Prof. James F. Shigley, veterinary sciences, has been given a sabbatical leave from February 1 to August 1 for study at the University of Pennsylvania and Cornell University Arthur S. Huell, professor of vocational education will take his sabbatical leave from January 1 to June, 1939 for world travel and investigation of home study and extension programs

Mr. Stephen W. Balduzza, English composition, will study at Harvard University during the next academic year while Arthur H. Reede, economics, will take a continuation of his leave of absence to continue graduate study, also at Harvard

Resident Enrollment At College Over Ten Thousand First Time

During the academic year of 1937-38, for the first time in history, the gross resident enrollment at the College exceeded 10,000

Figures released today by William S. Hoffman, registrar, indicate an enrollment of 9,342 including both undergraduate and graduate students in regular and summer sessions Counting students who enrolled in two or more sessions the figure totals 10,010 Enrolled in the seven undergraduate divisions of the College during the main session last year were 5,599 students Others enrolled were distributed as follows: undergraduate students in summer sessions, 2,321, graduate students in summer sessions, 833, graduate students in regular session, 443, special students, 252, undergraduate center students, 347, agriculture short course enrollments, 165.
