

Drummond Is Named Head Of Home Econ. Department

On July 1, Miss Laura W. Drummond succeeded Miss Edith P. Chace as director of the home economics department here after 12 years of service with Temple University. She heads a faculty of nineteen with approximately 355 girls in the department, or about one third of the total women enrollment.

A graduate of William Penn High school and the Philadelphia Normal school, she received the bachelor of science degree in Education from the University of Pennsylvania in cooperation with Drexel Institute a year later, 1927. She received her master of arts degree from Teachers College, Columbia. She was recently been working for her doctorate at Columbia University.

Spent Summer Here

Miss Drummond spent one summer here following her undergraduate work at Drexel and Pennsylvania. She is a past president of the Pennsylvania Hotel Economics Association and from 1912-1914, was consultant to the State Emergency Relief Board. The new home economics director is a member of Chi Omega, social

fraternity, and of three honorary societies, Kappa Delta Pi, Pi Lambda Theta, and Phi Delta Gamma. Miss Chace, who headed the home economics department since 1918, has retired with the title of director emerita of home economics.

147 Attended First Summer Term In 1910

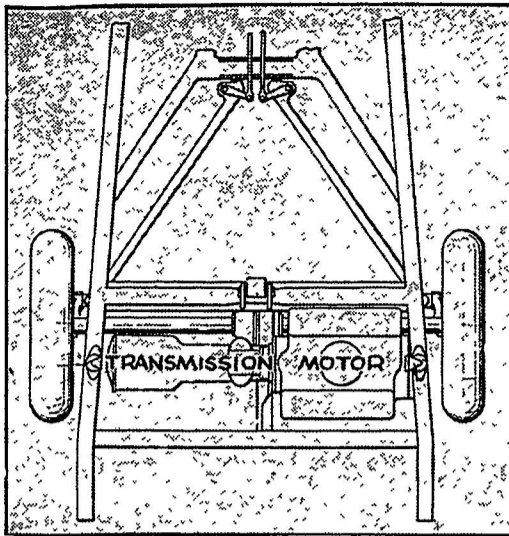
One hundred forty seven persons attended the first Summer Session 28 years ago when fifty subjects were offered. Last summer over 3,200 attended the summer session and this year a like number are enrolled.

Designed at the beginning to aid teachers in Pennsylvania schools to obtain certificates in additional subjects, the Summer Sessions have grown to a point where they now attract, in addition undergraduate students who wish to obtain extra credits by summer study and graduate students working on advanced programs leading to masters' and doctors' degrees.

The original summer work embraced only one session. Nine years ago the summer program expanded in yet another way. At that time an inter-session, which opens a few days after the commencement of the June class and continues until the beginning of the main summer session, was added.

In 1932 still a third, the post-session, was placed on the College summer program. This begins shortly after the main session and continues until the end of August. Thus the present summer program now includes three separate sessions, the largest and most important, of course, being the six weeks main summer session.

This drawing, submitted with Ford's application for a patent, shows the compact arrangement of a V-type, eight-cylinder motor with transmission, differential and other mechanical parts assembled over the rear axle. The arrangement is designed to provide a more direct drive from engine to wheels and permit a more unobstructed view of the road.
