

Name 56 Seniors As Freshman Counsellors

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Soose Decisions Quail In 1st Ten-Round Professional Bout

A career that took hold in the College's boxing ring, blossomed out Monday night as Billy Soose completed his seventh professional bout and his first 10-rounder, a winner by decision over the ring veteran, Al Quail of Pittsburgh Sports writers spared no adjectives in their praise of the Penn State star, and expressed their thoughts that of the fighters on the card Monday night, Soose was "the most logical for the climb up."

As the final bout between Billy Conn and Teddy Yarosz, ended in a brawl, the fans looked upon the Soose Quail show as the hit of the evening as both boys kept up a steady pace throughout the fight.

A brace of right hand jabs to the jaw, dropped Billy to the canvas early in the third round, but taking the nine count, Soose got up, lost that round and the fourth, and went on to take all the rest, including the first two.

Soose Drops Quail

Soose retaliated in the ninth round when a left hook caught Quail's chin sending him to the floor. However, the Pittsburgh veteran got on his feet before the count started. Ringsiders were almost certain that Soose would be belted out in their laps by the more experienced Quail, but as Soose kept his left flicking in Al's face and crossing whip-like rights to the jaw and body, at the same time blocking and pulling away from Quail's punches, the fans became more at ease and settled down for a good bout.

Leo Houck, Penn State's boxing coach who tutored Soose for two years, was in his corner during the fight giving his former pupil advice and hints Houck was in Soose's training camp since Friday, adding Paul Moss, Billy's manager, with the conditioning of their fighter.

Settles the "ifs"

A lot of "ifs" were settled in the victory Monday night for the young middleweight. And all of them were settled in his favor. Billy had little to lose in this fight. Al Quail is a four-year veteran, a tough lad with hard punches and a body that can absorb plenty of punishment. Never a champion, he has, nevertheless, mixed with the best.

All Soose had to lose Monday night was his consecutive win streak, which in the long run, doesn't mean too much. What he gained was the confirmation of the publicity on his West coast fights, the eye of the promoters, a place in line to meet Billy Conn, Teddy Yarosz, and other leading middleweights, and the admiration and backing of the Pittsburgh fans.

Soose and Lawson are scheduled for an eight-round fight.

The supporting card will see Clearfield's Bill Flannagan in the six-round semi-windup brawl against Eivin Saahn of Pittsburgh. Flannagan has lost only 10 bouts in 201 meets.

Petro George, 170, Soose's California sparring mate, will box Ira Hughes of Pittsburgh, Bill Swanshire, Chaleron, boxes Johnny Buckner, 135, of Pittsburgh; and in the 118-pound bracket, Eddie Tuscher, of Pittsburgh, will face Joey Sulk of Bladock.

Advance tickets, tax included, are on sale for \$85, \$1.65 and \$2.20.
