

Two Honorary Fraternities Recognize Superior Freshman Scholarship

Over 40 Other Groups Reward Achievement Among Upper Classes

Phi Eta Sigma, Alpha Lambda Delta Open To First-Year Students Here

Freshmen bent upon superior scholastic achievement may have their ability recognized by the only existing freshman honorary fraternities on the campus—Phi Eta Sigma, for men, Alpha Lambda Delta, for women.

At least 40 other groups, including four local organizations, recognize further achievement in the upper classes.

25 Average Needed

With chapters in 23 colleges and universities throughout the country, Phi Eta Sigma elects to membership here each year from 35 to 40 freshmen. Primary prerequisite is a one- or two-semester average of at least 2.5 (3 is tops).

Identical requirements hold true in Alpha Lambda Delta, sister organization of Phi Eta Sigma, which each year initiates from five to eight woman freshmen.

Although honorary fraternities usually set up minimum requirements for membership, attainment of the established requirements

does not preclude membership. Generally, elections are held in the fall and spring among active members of the organizations who vote on the qualified candidates.

Phi Beta Kappa Tops

Of the 40-odd upperclass fraternities, perhaps the tops of them all as far as all-around scholastic achievement is concerned is Phi Beta Kappa, which was installed here just last year. Although the first class of candidates was initiated last spring, no definite prerequisites for membership have yet been announced.

Another scholastic fraternity is Phi Kappa Phi, established in 1900. To qualify for membership, students must have at least a 2.4 mark and be in the upper 20th of the class. Election takes place in the senior year.

Proficiency in the School of Liberal Arts is acknowledged among others by Delta Sigma Phi, commerce and finance honorary, Phi Sigma Iota, romance languages; Pi Mu Epsilon, mathematics, and Pi Gamma Mu, social science.

3 Journalism Groups

Three journalism organizations cite extraordinary ability along these lines, including Sigma Delta Chi, the top national journalism honorary fraternity, Theta Sigma

Interclass Finance Committee Handles Dues, Expenditures

How are your class dues, expenditures, etc., handled? The answer is the Interclass Finance Committee.

The committee of students, which includes the various class treasurers and Neil M. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics as ex-officio member, also controls the incomes from class dances and from interclass sports on the campus.

The policy and aim of the committee is to bring the finances of all extra-curricular activities under its control so that those doing the work will receive proper remuneration.

For debates there are Delta Sigma Rho, nationally famed forensic fraternity, and Delta Alpha Delta, women's debating. Pi Lambda Sigma cites pre-legal students. Along musical lines, Kappa Gamma Psi and Phi Mu Alpha, national professional honoraries, award membership for excellence in campus musical circles. In dramatics, two major or four

minor roles in student productions or demonstration of proficiency in other dramatic lines qualify students for membership in Theta Alpha Phi.

Five in Agriculture

Five honorary and professional organizations are available to students in the School of Agriculture, including Gamma Sigma Delta, agriculture; Alpha Tau Alpha, agricultural education; Pi Alpha Xi, floriculture; Xi Sigma Pi, forestry; and Alpha Phi Omega, scouting.

Membership to an even half-dozen organizations is available to students in the Schools of Chemistry and Physics and Engineering.

Included in Chemistry and Physics are Phi Lambda Upsilon, chemistry; Sigma Pi Sigma, physics; Iota Sigma Pi, women's chemists; Alpha Pi Mu, pre-medical; Alpha Nu, astronomy; and Sigma Xi, science.

In the School of Engineering are Tau Beta Pi, engineering; Sigma Tau engineering; Pi Tau Sigma, mechanical engineering; Chi Epsilon, civil engineering; Eta Kappa Nu, electrical engineering; and Pi Gamma Alpha, fine arts.

A heavy number of national honorary and professional fraternities also is available in the School of Education, where students may qualify for membership in any of seven organizations.

These include Kappa Delta Pi, and Kappa Phi Kappa, education; Psi Chi, psychology; Omicron Nu Kappa, home economics; Iota Lambda Sigma, industrial education; and Pi Lambda Theta, women's education.

Physical education students may qualify for Phi Sigma Pi, men's honorary; or Lakonides, local women's honor group. Mineral Industries is a Sigma Gamma Epsilon

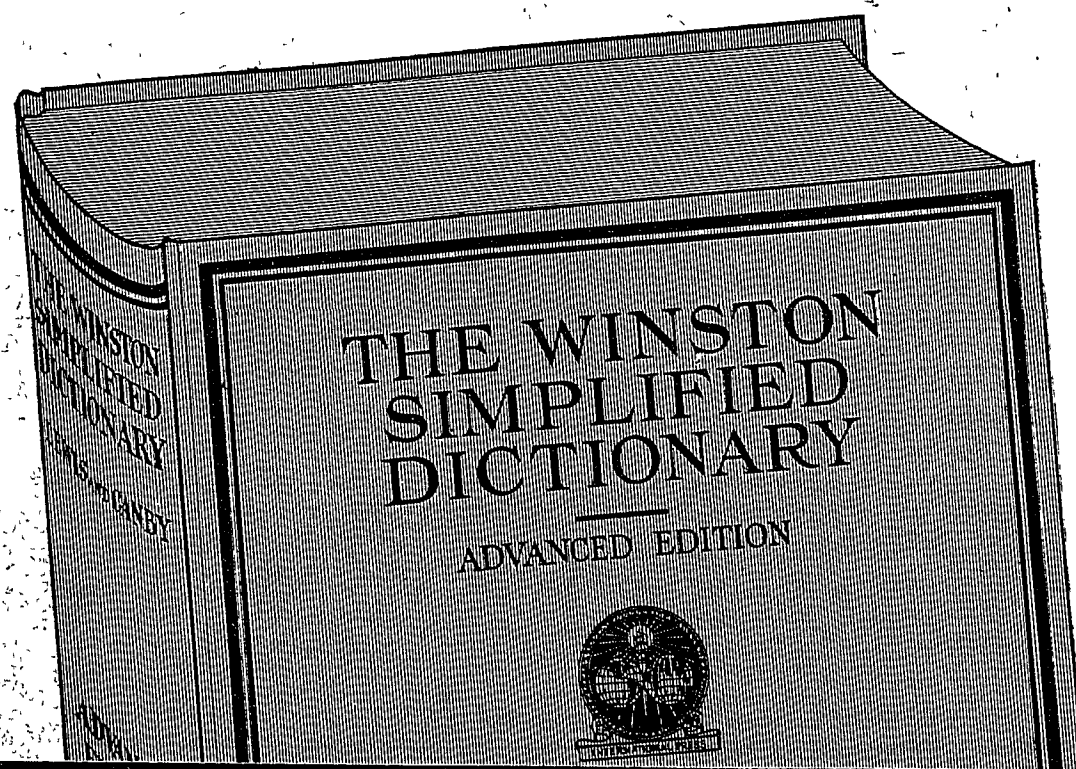
