

Complete Text Of Rushing Code

The complete text of the 1938 fraternity rushing code follows:

Article I—Purpose

Section 1 The existence of this code is for the prime purpose of insuring fair play among the several fraternities during the rushing season, as it shall later be defined.

Article II—Definitions

Section 2 Rushing shall mean any contact between fraternity men and rushees, whether it be by telephone, telegraph, mail, messenger, in person or by any other means that may hereafter be devised.

Section 3 Rushing shall mean any member of the Class of 1942, except those who enter with advanced standing. The records of the College registrar shall be used to verify the standing of a prospective rushee.

Section 4 Open House shall mean that freshmen may or shall be entertained within the fraternity houses under the following regulations:

(a) Freshmen cannot be accompanied into any fraternity house by any fraternity member, excepting between the hours of 6 p. m. to 10 p. m. Sunday, September 11. Any fraternity so desiring may go

and attend freshmen to the house during this four-hour period.

Section 5 Rushing Boundaries shall be limited to the borough limits of State College, Pa., as defined by the official borough map, excepting only authorized parties properly chaperoned.

(a) To receive authorization a fraternity must present petition to the Vigilante Committee containing place of party, chaperone and intentions. The Vigilante Committee will be the final word on the authorization of such a party.

Section 6 Silent Periods shall mean that on the dates and times hereafter prescribed in this code, there shall be no contact or communication of any sort between fraternity men and rushees.

Section 7 Informal Period shall mean the following:

(a) Freshmen shall not be allowed in the several fraternity houses.

(b) Freshmen shall not be entertained in any eating or refreshment establishment, nor shall they be given refreshment of any kind in or at any place.

Section 8 Date Cards shall mean the official cards sold to freshmen by the Interfraternity Council for the purpose of having fraternity men record thereon the name of their respective houses, in the spaces provided for engagements during the formal period.

Section 9 Preference Cards. Name given to the cards on which freshmen place their first and second choice. They will be gotten and presented at Student Union Saturday, September 17, between 7 and 8 p. m. Failure to turn in a preference card will prohibit freshmen from being pledged for a period of 3 days if a fraternity pledges one of these men it will be subject to a fine of \$10.

Article III—Schedule for Rushing Season

Sunday night and continues through until Monday night, September 19, at 6 o'clock, when fraternity men appear at the fraternity of their choosing for pledging.

Section 2 Each Committee member shall be paid out of the Interfraternity treasury a sum not exceeding \$15 as a consideration of services rendered.

Section 3 The Committee shall investigate any violation reported to them, and further shall investigate on their own initiative from time to time, to insure full and proper enforcement of this code.

Section 4 When the Committee shall find any member or members of any fraternity, guilty of violating this code in any manner whatsoever, they shall be bound to impose the mandatory penalty herein described.

Section 5 The penalty for violating this code in any manner whatsoever, shall be postponement by one (1) day the pledging of freshmen or any other rushee, i. e., the silent period shall continue from Sunday, September 18, at 8 p. m. to Tuesday, September 20, at 6 p. m.

Article IV—Regulations

Section 1 No girls shall be used in rushing at any time or in any manner. This also means that girls may not be present in fraternity houses during the times when freshmen are being pledged, if the provisions of this code are permitted to be in fraternity houses.

Section 2 No rushing may be conducted in any beer distributing establishments.

Section 3 Alumni and faculty members shall be bound by the provisions of this code.

Section 4 Late registrants of the class of 1942 shall be bound by this code. They may receive instructions and date cards at the Student Union Office in Old Main. A list of such registrants shall be posted at the Student Union Office daily.

Section 5 Freshmen shall receive engagement cards in the First Floor Lounge of Old Main on Monday, September 12, from 5 p. m. to 11 p. m.

Section 6 No fraternity shall be allowed more than two (2) engagements (viz., breakfast, luncheon, dinner, cabin or swimming party) with any freshman from Tuesday, September 13, at 12 noon to Saturday, September 17, at 7 p. m., inclusive.

Section 7 This code may be amended by a majority vote of the Interfraternity Council at a regularly scheduled meeting.

Section 8 In the event that an emergency should be found to exist due to a shortage of rooms during the rushing season of September 1938, this code may be invalidated by a majority vote of Interfraternity Council at a regularly scheduled meeting.

Divided into silent, informal and open-house periods, the rushing season will begin at 1 p. m., September 10 Sunday evening, fraternity men will be permitted to accompany freshmen to the house.

Informal rushing will be held Monday and Tuesday, during which time fraternity men will be allowed to contact freshmen anywhere except in the house or in eating establishments.

Rushing Cards Monday

Rushing cards will go on sale to freshmen Monday, and the following day arrangements for dates will be sanctioned. During the remainder of the week, breakfast, luncheon and dinner dates will be permitted.

Another open-house period is slated for Sunday, September 18, followed by a silent period which will end when pledging starts at 6 p. m., Monday, September 19. That night after 8 o'clock, fraternity men will be permitted to contact at all times freshmen outside the house.

(Under the old code, resumption of open rushing was prohibited for one month after the close of the 10-day rushing season.)

Committee to Enforce Rules

A three-man enforcement committee, consisting of faculty members not affiliated with fraternities which have chapters here, has been established by the code. Each member will be paid not more than \$15 by the Interfraternity Council.


