

Women's Rushing Season Held During Second Semester

Sorority Campaign Will Officially Begin With Party On February 8

Houses Limited To \$20 Expenditures For Open Rushing Period By Code; Stiff Penalties Fixed

Unlike the men's fraternity rushing season, the women's rushing season does not open officially until the first Wednesday of the second semester, February 8.

Officially opening the season will be a party sponsored by Pan-Hellenic Council and open to all girls, including freshmen and transfers, interested in sororities.

From then until noon Thursday, no individual contact will be permitted between sorority women and prospective members.

Open rushing, however, will begin at noon Sunday, February 5, and continue until 9 p. m., Thursday, February 9.

Houses will be limited to expenditures totaling not more than \$20 during this period. An itemized account of all expenditures must be filed with the Pan-Hellenic

New Women's Dorm To Have Four Hostesses

Frances Atherton Hall Will Be Divided Into Four Units; One For Freshmen

Betty Bell, Mrs. Gail Pope, Mrs. Anna Seale and Ruth Weidner have been named as hostesses to the Frances Atherton Hall, Charlotte E. Ray, dean of women, announced.

The dormitory, which will house 501 girls next fall, will be divided into four units, three reserved for the upperclass women, each to be chaperoned by one of the above women.

The northwest unit will be for first-year girls and will accommodate about 125. Miss Bell, assistant to the dean of women in charge of freshmen, will continue in that position and also will serve as hostess to the freshman unit. She will have two senior students assisting her in managing the unit.

Miss Weidner, who was graduated last January from the College, will chaperone the northeast unit of upperclass girls and will act also as health advisor to the entire hall. She was the dormitory nurse in McAllister Hall, while a student here.

Mrs. Pope, Franklin, and Mrs. Seale, Pearl River, N. Y. will act as counselors to the other two units. Emma Richardson, supervisor of dormitories, will serve as general supervisor of the building. Her office will be located in the new dormitory.

Women's Rushing Code

The complete text of the women's rushing code for the 1938-39 school year follows.

Article I—Bidding Requirements

Section 1 No woman shall bid unless she has been registered as a student in the Pennsylvania State College for one semester. This includes freshmen, sophomores, juniors, seniors, transfers and graduate students.

Section 2 Official bidding periods shall be designated by the Council.

Article II

Section 1 Rushing season shall officially open on Wednesday of the second semester, with a party sponsored by Pan-Hellenic. This party shall be for all girls, including freshmen and transfers, interested in sororities.

Section 2 There shall be no individual contact from Wednesday to the succeeding noon of the second semester. This includes invitations for all periods of the following week.

Section 3 There shall be open house at all the sororities on the afternoons of Thursday, February 2, Friday, February 3, and Saturday, February 4. (Length to be decided by Council.) No girl shall remain longer than 30 minutes at any one house nor expect a personal invitation to any one house.

Section 4 Open rushing period shall begin Sunday noon, February 5, and extend through Thursday, February 9, to 9 p. m.

Section 5 Expenditures for the period of open house and open rushing shall not exceed \$20. An itemized account of all expenditures on a regulation sheet shall be handed to the Pan-Hellenic Rushing Chairman at the end of the semester.

Article III

Section 1 There shall be a formal party held Saturday before the formal bidding. Invitations must be distributed no sooner than 9 p. m. Thursday, February 9. The acceptance or regret to the invitations to the formal party shall be placed by the rushee in the boxes provided for that purpose by the Pan-Hellenic Council between 1 and 5 p. m. Friday, February 10.

Section 2 These parties shall be divided into two one-and-a-half hour periods with a half hour between for convenience in getting around, the rushee may attend two of them—having signified before, in answering invitations, at which period she would come, and the rushee shall not stay longer than 1 1/2 hours at any one house.

Section 3 For this formal party, the expenditures shall not exceed \$20. This shall include the expenses of the actives, rushees, and all other participants. Itemized accounts for this party shall be presented to the Pan-Hellenic Rushing Chairman not later than 11 p. m. of the last day of the rushing season.

Article IV

Section 1 Bidding following rushing season shall be by preferential ballot.

Section 2 All work entailed in bidding shall be handled by a disinterested party to be chosen each year by the rushing committee from the following suggestions: (1) A committee composed of the Dean of Women and a secretary, the latter to be paid \$5. (2) Student Union Office. (3) A committee of city Pan-Hellenic representatives.

Section 3 The list of girls who have been bidden by a sorority must be in the office of the disinterested group not later than 11

p. m. on the Saturday following the formal party.

Section 4 The disinterested group shall see that those bidden receive ballots by 10 a. m. on Sunday following the formal party.

Section 5 Rushees must return ballots to the office of the disinterested group not later than 3 p. m. Sunday following the last party. The disinterested group shall notify sororities which girls have been chosen to belong to them and the sororities are free to acknowledge the acceptance by calling the girls on the telephone.

Article V

Section 1 There shall be a silent period preceding the formal bidding. It shall extend from 9 p. m. Thursday until Saturday at 5 p. m.

Section 2 There shall be a silent period at the close of the rushing season. It shall extend from 9 p. m. the night of the formal party until the following day when the acceptances are issued from the office of the disinterested group.

Section 3 There shall be a two-week silent period following formal bidding.

Section 4 By silence is meant no communication or conversation between sorority members and rushees.

Article VI

Section 1 All pledges, alumnae, patronesses and sponsors shall be bound by the same rules as the active members.

Section 2 Cars may be used during the rushing season. The cost of gas must be included in the allowance for entertainment as designated by the Council.

Section 3 Men shall be excluded from rushing.

Article VII

Section 1 There shall be open bidding at all times during the College year except at vacation, during the rushing season, and the two weeks following the last day of the rushing season. Open bids to girls eligible shall not be post-marked before the hour that College opens the first day of the second semester in College.

Section 2 Girls who are eligible for open bidding are those eligible for rushing season in Article I, Section 1.

Section 3 Open bidding shall be a written formal bid sent through the mail from a sorority to a rushee.

Section 4 There shall be no communication between sorority members and a girl bidden during open bidding season until an answer is received through the mail.

Article VIII

Section 1 There shall be a Pan-Hellenic Rushing Chairman as provided for in the By-Laws, Article IV.

Section 2 All violations shall be submitted in writing and acted upon by the Judiciary Board, as provided for in the by-laws.

Section 3 Ignorance or misrepresentation of the code shall not be considered an adequate defense when violations have occurred.

Section 4 Any sorority exceeding the allotted amount for the rushing season shall be allowed the following year only one-half the allotted amount for the season.

Definitions of Terms

Rushing—Any entertainment of new women students that involves expenditure of money on the part of the sorority. This shall include parties, meals, movies, or soda fountains.

Pan-Hellenic parties—Those parties arranged by Pan-Hellenic Council, to be conducted by all sorority women, for all new students, for the purpose of getting acquainted.

Open house—Afternoons (no more than three) set aside in February as designated by Pan-Hellenic Council for all sororities to be open to any new student who may wish to call during the set hours. The new student will be invited only through the Council and shall remain no longer than 30 minutes at any one house.

Silence—No communication or conversation between sorority members and rushees.

Social privileges—Privileges conferred by a sorority upon transfer students who are members of sororities not on the campus.

named Frear Laboratories, in honor of Dr. William Frear, who became famous as an agricultural scientist here.

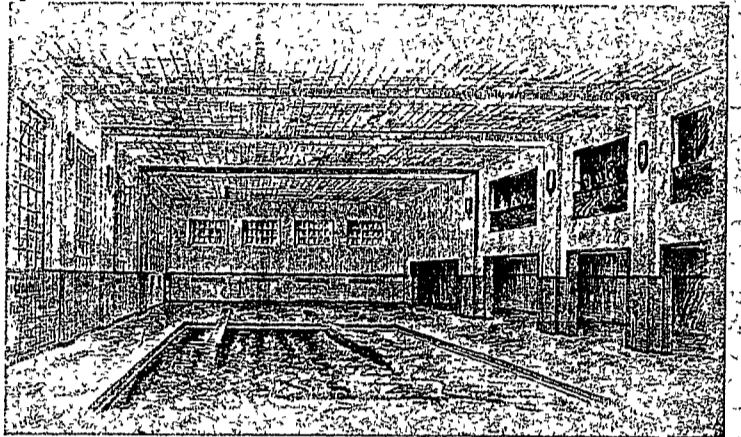
Meanwhile, the name of Frear Hall, men's dormitory has been changed to Jordan Hall, in honor of Francis Jordan president of the

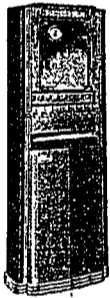

Producers Launch \$250,000 Contest

NEW YORK, Aug. 31—A \$1,000,000 motion picture publicity campaign which includes \$250,000 in prizes for the public, was announced at a meeting of producers, distributors and exhibitors at the Hotel Astor.

The principal element of the plan is a newspaper advertising campaign. The \$250,000 contest will offer 5,000 prizes. The first prize will be \$50,000. The campaign is being set up through the cooperation of producers, distributors and exhibitors. Individual companies and individual pictures will not be advertised. Instead, emphasis will be placed on the essential place movies have come to occupy in the life of the nation.

The campaign will aim to show the public in the words of its slogan, "motion pictures are your best entertainment." While the campaign will not start until tomorrow, pictures released by all companies in August will be included in the campaign.

Among these pictures in the contest are "Fou's a Crowd," "Daughters Courageous," "Too Hot to Handle," "Listen Darling," "Spawn of the North," "The Unholy Bees," "Breaking the Ice," "Cafefree," "Algeis," "Young in Heart," "There Goes My Heart," "Alexandri's Ragtime Band," "My Lucky Star," and "That Certain Age."
