At this time all freshmen coming out for football will report and the squad will be put into uniform.

Several good prospects for the squad are expected to be on hand when the first practice begins. Among the freshmen admitted to college, who are expected to turn out are Bill Bates, Abington High School, Dan Biew, Vaughn Evans, and Chuck Wilkinson, all from Wyoming Seminary, Larry Egenouch, Mike Cavinski, of Johnstown, and Floyd Kolenda, Allouppa High School.

The last time State tasted the bitter pill of defeat was in 1932 when Syracuse topped them in a close battle. Since then it's been an unswerving victory chain, qualified only by four ties.

Faced with an eight-game roster this season, the Jeffrey men realize that it's going to be a crucial year. On one hand they have a lot to lose, on the other, there's the glory of another undefeated season staring them in the face.

Brown Replaces Yale

The battles this year will feature the booter delegations from Western Maryland, Navy, Brown, Bucknell, Syracuse, Army, Gettysburg, and Temple. Brown replaces Yale as an opponent.

Last fall Gettysburg, to a 3-0 tune, was the first victim of the Jeffrey squad. Bucknell lost next, 5-0, Yale was vanquished, 2-0, Temple, 2-1, Syracuse, 2-0, the following a scoreless tie with the West Pointers, Navy, lost, 3-0, Western Maryland lastly humbly accepted a decisive 9-0 beating.

### Harriers To Open Practice Tuesday

With time for just three weeks of organized practice before meeting Manhattan, one of their toughest opponents of the year, Coach Chick Werner's cross-country aspirants will begin regular training on Tuesday.

The tosy outlook at the end of last year's season, when it looked as if six of the seven regular varsity men would be available for competition this year and several very good freshmen would be eligible for the varsity, has turned a dull pink.

Squad Weakened

Along with the graduation of Captain Pete Olevy, the squad has been further weakened by letterman Norman Gordon's failure to return to school this fall.

Two freshmen who showed great promise on the yearling squad will not be back. Joe Foley, freshman numeral winner, aggravated a heart condition shortly after the end of last season and is no longer able to run, and Milton Kaczka, Bill Smith, yearling harrier who cut himself a piece of fame by snatching first place in the Freshman ICAAAA championships last year, will be gunning for a varsity position and a chance at the major event in Van Cortland Park this fall.

Four juniors who all saw varsity action last year will be battling for regular berths on the hill and-dale team. They are Herb Nipson, Jim Hostetler, Graham Miller, and Mac McGlinsev.

Henry Bashore '40 and Dick John '40 will return from last year's squad and will be battling for places along with Bill Griest '39, Howard Yeiger '41 and James Williams '40.

Several men from Mont Alto will

also be available. They will be led by Dave Conger, nephew of Ray Conger, local instructor who once defeated the great Finnish star, Paavo Nurmi.

Face Strong Opponents

Included on the Lion's schedule this year are two of the strongest cross-country teams in the East, Manhattan and Syracuse.

Both meets will be run on the Penn State course and Coach Werner expects that if the Lions win these meets they will be favored to take the ICAAAA championships in New York City in November.

Coach Werner has issued a call for all cross-country candidates to report to him at Rec Hall after registration. This includes both freshmen and varsity candidates.

### IM Football Game Eliminates Injuries

A new type of football—one in which the possibility of injuries is reduced to the barest minimum will again be the feature of the fall intramural season this year.

The game, a brain-child of Gen. Bischoff, director of intramural activities, is a non-physical contact type of game and is not a variation of regular football. It was adopted last fall by the Intramural Board and proved successful in its first season here.

Passing To Any Man

Highlights of the game are the legalization of passes from any where in the field, elimination of crouch position in line, barring of all charging and hip or shoulder tackling, and use of a five-man line and frat-man backfield in

stead of the regular eleven-man team. The most revolutionary rule of the game is the one which permits passing in any direction to any man on the team, as long as the ball-carrier has not been touched by a defensive player. It is possible that several minor changes will be made in the game this year, since its use last year was an experiment.

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### Women in Sports

"The Women's Recreation Association extends a hearty welcome to the incoming freshmen women," said Rachel Bechdel, president of the organization.

"This year marks the beginning of a new era for women's athletics and recreation activities at Penn State," she added.
